A record of industrial development in any state will do more to attract capital than anything else. Let the world know what Idaho is doing in this line.—Pacific Coast Manufacturer.

Nov. 6—Cottonwood, Idaho is a growing town of 800 people and it is in need of several industries including a meat packing plant, bakery and steam laundry. This town claims to be the largest shipping station of hogs of any town west of the Rocky mountains.

Moscow—Miller Co. enlarging and improving mill and elevator. Pocatello—Pocatello Traction & Interurban Ry. Co. organizes with purpose to build electric passenger and freight line between Ashton and Preston connecting with present line on to Ogden and Salt Lake.

The \$1,000,000 Kimberly sugar factory of the Amalgamated Sugar Co. starts grinding and thousands of dollars will soon be distributed among the farmers for their beets.

American Falls—Mountain home people are talking of forming of forming highway district and voting \$100,000 for good roads.

The political fight is now over and business and industry will be given a chance to catch its breath before congress begins to legislate and regulate it again.

Coeur d'Alene—Inland cannery ready to start, thirty people on payroll.

Conr d'Alene—Approximate cost of first section of proposed heating system for this city is \$101,000.

Idaho farmers in prosperous shape and outlook good for coming year.

Nezperce—Turner Bros. receive check for \$50,820.55 for portion of grain crop.

Arco to have a steam laundry. Osburn—Operations started on new mill of Silverado Mining Co.

Moscow—156 acre farm near here sells for \$19,500 on \$125 an acre, highest price paid for some time.

Lewiston—\$150,000 bonds for Lapwai highway district to be voted on.

Rose Lake—10 mile flume just completed by O'Neil-Irvine Co. to tap 100,000,000 feet of white pine. Logging operations to begin at once.

Twin Falls—\$4000 an acre reported received by farmers in this section for season's crop.

Emmett—Big new sawmill almost completed and 7 carloads of machinery, which is only small part of order, have arrived.

Emmett—Continental Oil Co. will erect 2 tanks here as distributing point for upper Payette valley.

When Congress meets next it has before it two measures of the utmost importance to the west. Satisfactory legislation of the development of waterpowers and a relief measure for oil operation under the Taft withdrawal order. Millions of dollars of capital to be invested await fair legislation on these subjects.

Hagerman expects to get \$8000 cheese factory.

Nampa—Overland cider plant using car of apples daily and will make 150,000 gallons this season.

Parma—Local cheese factory making good, will make brick cheese.

Arco—Building activity calls for \$150,000 expenditure here this year.

Cokeville—Machinery arriving for new electric light plant and work expected to proceed rapidly.

New forest service two wire telephone line to be constructed between Hailey and Ketchum.

Nampa—Mountain States Tel. Co. improving and enlarging system here to extent of \$25,000 when completed.

Jerome—New pickle works opens.

Malta—Plan proposed to irrigate dry farm land above pumping system of South Side Minidoka project.

Union Pacific system calls for bids on 2500 freight cars using 15,000,000 feet of lumber, specification requiring all lumber to be purchased from Union Pacific territory in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Wallace—Anaconda Copper Co's option at \$256,050 on Douglas group of claims in Pine Creek district extended six months.

Moscow—Vinegar plant producing 10,000 gallons daily from \$6 a ton apples.

Cottonwood—New 50,000 bushel elevator operating and work progressing rapidly on flour mill.

Lucile—\$3500 being raised for suspension bridge across Salmon river here.

Farm and Garden

BUILD UP TIRED LAND.

Nature Should Be Helped to Restore Hard Worked Fields.

[Dr. H. B. Brown, Mississippi station.] Help nature build up the fields that have worked too hard and have been turned out to rest. If grasses, corn stalks, leaves and other organic materials are left on the land they will decay and add humus to the soil. Where these materials are burned off, however, all the organic substances are given off in the form of gases and only the mineral matter is left in the ash.


The improvement to the land if all grasses and other growth were allowed to rot instead of being burned would be worth millions of dollars to any state. The destruction of useful plants is another harmful result of burning off the fields. Fire will totally destroy the seed of all the true clovers, which are invaluable as soil builders. Many of the most valuable grasses can be killed by burning. Even Bermuda will die if burned repeatedly. Perhaps the greatest harm is done in the woods by the killing out of seeds as they drop from the trees and by killing the young trees, thus preventing the reproduction of forests.

Besides the damage done by fires in the removal of plant food and killing out of vegetation they greatly hasten erosion. On the other hand, the corn stalks and grasses in the fields and the sage grasses in worn out soils prevent the rains washing out gullies and help to hold the water as it soaks into the ground.

PREPARING THE DASHEEN.

A Staple Article of Food in the South is Invading the North.

The dasheen, which has been successfully raised in some of our southern states and Arizona, has become quite popular as a rival to the potato. It outdoes the potato in that it can be grown as a summer crop in a region where the potato must be grown almost entirely as a spring crop. It ripens its tubers in October

and furnishes them for the table at a season when northern grown potatoes have to be shipped in.

This vegetable is a staple article of food for millions of people in tropical and subtropical countries. In general it is used in the different ways in which the white potato and the sweet potato are used. The flesh of the large spherical corms and of the larger tubers (which are usually much smaller than the corms) is frequently somewhat gray or violet when cooked, but this does not affect the flavor. Baked dasheens, stuffed dasheens, scalloped dasheens, boiled dasheens, fried dasheens, mashed dasheens, creamed dasheens, dasheen salad, dasheens as filling for fowls and other meats, dasheen soup, candied dasheens, dasheen pie, dasheen pudding, dasheen shoots, dasheen greens—prepare and cook as you would potatoes. This is a novelty that amateur gardeners will enjoy trying.

Success in the Vegetable Garden.

Have good soil properly prepared. Purchase seeds from a reliable seed house. Always sow seeds according to directions. Give proper cultivation from the time the seedlings appear until the crop is harvested. A heavy clay soil will not produce good vegetables. Clay soil should be lightened by applying siftings from coal ashes or sand and lime should be used freely, with plenty of stable manure.

Cultivation must begin as soon as the seedlings appear, and sometimes before, keeping the weeds from getting a start. Never allow the ground to become hard or "baked" on the surface. When the seedlings are tall enough to thin give the plants ample room.—W. M. L., Batesville, Ind.
