Mrs. Bertha Hagen vs. Sarah Sampson et al—Default, judgment against all defendants in favor of plaintiff at her cost.

Thomas McCook Sr. vs. Ernest Fox—Withdrawn.

Edward C. Teeple vs. R. N. Hendricks, Administrator, et al—Stricken from docket.

Chas. P. Nash vs. C. M. & St. P. Ry Co.—Plaintiff takes leave to amend petition.

Marshall & Murray vs. O. H. Fay—Settled.

S. D. Young vs. Emma Sanborn—default; decree for plaintiff as prayed, at his cost and on payment of same.

Maude E. Booth vs. J. Arthur Booth—decree of divorce granted plaintiff, with marriage prohibited for one year on payment of costs.

Anthony Machovec vs. Laura Willard et al—decree for plaintiff quieting title as prayed, at plaintiff's costs and on payment of same.

Edward Giroux vs. Carl Marling—Default; judgment for plaintiff to \$300, interests and costs and continued as to other relief asked.

Ellsworth Donaldson vs. W. W. Hungerford et al—Plaintiff takes leave to amend petition.

A. J. Owens vs. Horace E. Eldredge et al—Decree for plaintiff against all defendants at his costs and on payment of same.

Charles Starbuck vs. George A. Eastman—Decree for plaintiff as prayed at his costs and on payment of same.

Belle Beveridge vs. Henry L. Graham—Submitted to court and adjudged that custody of Marvel F. Graham be awarded the father, Henry L. Graham. Judgment against plaintiff for costs.

C. P. Nash vs. Egbert Brownell et al—Decree for plaintiff as prayed at his costs and on payment of same.

J. H. Luers vs. John Miller—Motion for more specific statement overruled. Defendant to have 20 days to plead further.

The O'Farrell Constructing Co. vs. The City of Cresco—By consent defendant to have 30 days to answer. In the event an answer so filed Howard County is made a defendant, said County may be brought into court at the next term by giving ten days' notice to County Auditor at least ten days before the term.

Ellen Freemire vs. F. N. Freemire—Default; judgment for \$1,446, interest 8 per cent. and attorney fee \$54.40 and costs.

George Kunes vs. William Kunes et al—Adjudged that real estate can-

not be equitably divided and a sale is ordered. S. A. Sutton is appointed referee and W. H. Tillson, W. F. Mitz and E. R. Thompson appraisers. Order made by consent of all parties.

Cora B. Degroff vs. Harrison Degroff—Divorce granted plaintiff and she awarded custody of adopted daughter, Vera, and awarded as alimony all the furniture in the house. No remarriage of parties within one year.
