He will marry Miss Laura H. Dekler of Henderson, Ky. He authorized announcement on the day after the primaries whether he was victor or vanquished. Mr. Dunn forgot all the worries of the campaign yesterday and began making plans for his wedding. He was not worrying any about the result.

### Old Settlers' Picnic

The old settlers of Howard county and vicinity, which includes all who can date their residence back to 1885, are earnestly requested to meet for a reunion and picnic on Thursday, June 13th, in the grove at the A. E. Bents' Nursery, adjoining Cresco, to meet at 10:30 o'clock.

### Additional Clerk for Cresco Post-office.

An additional clerk has been allowed the Cresco postoffice, and to fill the position an examination will be held at Cresco on June 29th, to select a suitable person to fill the position under civil service rules. The position carries a salary of \$600 per annum for the first year, with salary promotion annually for five years for efficiency and faithfulness.

For application forms and instructions, apply to W. C. Patterson at the Cresco postoffice. All applications must be filed with the secretary of the eighth civil service district in St. Paul, Minn., not later than June 27th.

The examination will consist of trials in spelling, arithmetic, letter writing, penmanship, copying from plain copy, and reading addresses.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 45, unless applicant has been discharged from military or naval service by reason of disability. Married women will not be admitted to the examination, unless divorced or separated from their husbands and self-supporting. Certain physical defects disqualify applicants and in the case of male, but not female applicants, height and weight are also considered.


