Subsequently a suit was commenced against
me by said Potter and Wheeler, and I was com-
pelled to inform Mr. Watson, and requested
therefor I so informed Mr. Watson, and re-
quested him to take charge of the defence of the
same, and he refused to do so, and I then told him
that I would have nothing more to do with it, and
I then consented to make the Machines, in in-
fringement of a copy of which is hereto annexed, &c.,

Whereas it hath been represented to us in our
Court of the United States, for the Southern
District of New York, sitting as a Court of Equi-
ty, on the part of Orlando B. Potter and Nathaniel
Wheeler, Complainants, that they, the said Or-
lando B. Potter and Nathaniel Wheeler, have lat-
ely exhibited their Bill of Complaint against you,
in said Court, charging you, the defendant, with
the said Joel Chase, the defendant, to be relieved
from the injunction, in which bill it is, among
other things, set forth, that you, the said de-
fendant, are violating and threatening to vio-
late certain exclusive rights and privileges
vested in said complainants, for constructing,
making, using, and vending to others to be used,
certain improvements or inventions, or either,
and that the actions and doing of you, the de-
fendant, are contrary to Equity and good con-
science; we, therefore, in consideration of the
premises, do strictly, and until the further order
