NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—The World says today, relative to George Francis Train, that it is the clear duty of our Minister at London to demand, without delay, the release of Train from arrest, if he has committed no crime, his immediate release, and satisfaction for the injury, if any doubt is felt by Mr. Adams.

Prompt instructions from Washington already given to have reached him, and that in case he had been arrested, he would be immediately released, and that they are safe in every country where laws they do not violate.

The Tribune says on the same subject: We are afraid we are not correctly informed about the imprisonment of Mr. Train. If true, then America must take decided ground. This government cannot permit the wanton arrest of American citizens by any power wholly arbitrary, and if they are unjustly arrested, they must be returned as promptly as we returned Mason and Schiell.

The Post says thus far no grounds for Mr. Train's arrest are alleged except his participation in French meetings on this side of the water. If once he is released, he will go straight out upon the rights of American citizens, calling for instant interposition on the part of our authorities.

The commercial says the arrest must have been wholly arbitrary, and all occasion made difficult between the two governments, than one hundred foolish fools like Mr. Train are worth.

THE LEGISLATURE.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 18, 1868. The following bills were introduced in the Senate, and passed on first reading:

By Mr. Cate: An act to amend the criminal law of the State, making the theft of some up to \$200 a petit larceny, and authorizing the justices of the Peace to summon a jury of five men to try all cases of petit larceny, and if the defendant should be convicted, he shall be confined in the county jail for such a time as may be agreed upon.

Mr. Fenton: A bill exempting \$1,000 worth of real estate from taxation, and in favor of every family, and exempting all the property of the wife, received both before and after marriage, from execution for the debt of her husband.

Mr. McCall: A bill to empower the Governor to authorize the organization of a militia company of thirty men in counties where the Sheriff makes affidavit that he is resisted in the performance of his duties.

Mr. Fenton: A resolution congratulating the country on the reinstatement of R. M. Stanton as Secretary of War was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—Messrs. Aldridge, Eckel, Eaton, Faxon, Gentry, Hays, Johnson, Keith, Matthews, Nelson, Norman, Patterson, Parker, Roberts, Smith, Underwood, Wilson, and Mr. Speaker. Yeas—18.

Noes—Messrs. Cate, Lindley, Lyle, McCall, and Wheeler—5.

The bill appropriating \$100,000 to the Mobile and Ohio Railroad Company passed its second reading.

The bill repealing an act conferring the elective franchise to certain aliens was lost on second reading in the Judiciary Committee recommending its rejection.

In the House, the bill making habitual drunkenness a cause for divorce passed its second reading.

The bill to prevent disfranchised rebels from practicing in the courts of the State was brought up in the Judiciary Committee recommending its rejection.

Mr. Bowles moved to non-concur in the report of the committee.

The eyes and nose being called for, the vote was taken, with the following result: Ayes 22, noes 41. So the bill refused to non-concur.

The question recurring upon a concurrence in the report of the committee, a discussion ensued, at the close of which the bill was withdrawn for amendment.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 21, 1867. There was very little done in this body yesterday. The Senate bill embodying the following provisions passed third reading:

To repeal an act giving grand juries discretion to make presentments, and to presentment, and giving any grand juror the right to present an indictment against any Clerk or deputy, Sheriff, or Justice of the Peace, or County Jailor, Trustee, Justice of the Peace, or County Jailor, and that the prosecutor to be necessary in such cases, on conviction said person shall be removed from office, and also making it an indictable offense for any person to get drunk publicly and use vulgar and profane language.
