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THE PRESS.

Meeting of the Tennessee Association at the Capitol in Nashville.

An Interesting Address from Colonel A. J. Keller, of the Memphis Association.

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State Items.

THE Potato crop is put down at 1,700,000 bushels, or an average yield of fifty bushels per acre.

The corn crop of Tennessee for 1870, is estimated at 47,500,000 or an average of twenty bushels per acre.

The late census returns develop the fact that Tennessee has a population 1,235,326 persons.

Tennessee has 6,703,333 acres of improved land, and 13,873,828 acres of unimproved land.

THE Tobacco crop of the State for year amount to 35,000,000 pounds, or an average of 540 lbs per acre.

Tennessee produced in 1870, 6,750,000 bushels of wheat. The average per acre was about eight and a half bushels.

The oat yield in this State last year, was 3,600,000 bushels; and the average yield per acre was about fifteen and one seventh bushels per acre.

The yield of butter is put down in this State, for 1870, at 10,000,000 lbs, at an average value of 25 cents per pound making an aggregate value of \$2,500,000.

SENATOR THURMAN.—This distinguished gentleman, in discussing Southern outrages hatched up by Holden, Bullock and Grant, made some good points:

What is a free election outrage in North Carolina to this? Then look at Texas, where the Governor appoints every single officer in the State except the members of the Legislature—appoints every election officer.

What would Senators from the North say to such a power as this vested in the Government of their States—the Democratic Governor of New York or Connecticut, for instance. He would roll over from the top of his seat.

Here is a chance to investigate the purity of elections. If, here in Washington, not two years ago, a negro was mobbed almost to death and what was his offense? The police were even powerless to protect him. You had ample power to redress this outrage, but nothing was done; not a voice was raised to denounce it.

But nevertheless all this, there can be little doubt that whatever scheme has been hatched by Butler and Morton will be carried out by "a strict party vote"—hated to the defenceless people of the South being the only point upon which the now scattered party of Radicals can be reunited, as I have had occasion very often to proclaim. Curiosity is, however, on tip toe to discover what the wretched Radical leaders can do to worry, harass and persecute these poor people. One thing, however, is certain, whatever of tyranny is now exercised towards them will be finally visited upon the Northern States, whether they will be friends or foes of the reigning powers.—Baltimore Gazette.
