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OUR WASHINGTON LETTER.

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THE EXTRA SESSION.

Gov. Hawkins Calls the General Assembly Together, Wednesday, December 7. PROCLAMATION. By virtue of the power and authority in me vested by sections 9 of act 3 of the constitution of the State...

From Pennsylvania there comes, as an undercurrent to the information that "bossism" still retains its grip upon the State, the news of the death of Mr. Bechtel. It is not much the intelligence of Mr. Bechtel's death that is regarded as an appropriate subject for editorial comment...

At a superficial glance this appears to be but another amusing curiosity in the long chapter of whimsicalities which have found expression in wills. It may be that there is nothing more in it, but to one who is accustomed not only to read but to reflect there must arise at least a suspicion of a deeper meaning. What that meaning may be, is, of course, a matter for speculation.

3. Fixing the times of holding the several courts in the eleventh judicial circuit at all. 5. To authorize the application of so much of the fund already appropriated for purposes of higher normal education as may be necessary to pay the fees of clerks, in cases in which the State is concerned, and to be sold for taxes, and purchased by the State during the years 1878 and 1879.

6. To make such additional appropriation as may be necessary to pay the expense of the enumeration of the State 21 years of age and upward, passed April 7, 1881, and approved April 7, 1881.

7. To provide for the payment of \$800,000 for which the comptroller of the State was, by an act of the General Assembly, entitled "An act for the relief of George E. Hinkle, former trustee of Wayne," passed April 7, 1881, instructed to draw his warrant on the treasurer of the State.

8. To make provision for the payment of \$325,500 for which the comptroller of the State was, by an act of the General Assembly, entitled "An act for the relief of George E. Hinkle, former trustee of Wayne," passed April 7, 1881, instructed to draw his warrant on the treasurer of the State.

9. To provide for the payment of the necessary expenses incident to said extraordinary session of the General Assembly.

10. To make all the needful provision for the organization and incorporation of manufacturing companies.

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THE VIRGINIA PREDICAMENT.

How the Readjusters Walked into the Republican Camp. Cameron, the newly elected Governor of Virginia, by the grace of God and the readjuster-republican coalition party, will enjoy the privilege of being inaugurated as the gubernatorial candidate for a short season.

The termination of this halcyon period will be the day that inaugurates into the gubernatorial chair of Virginia. He will then be in the condition of the people of the middle ages, of whom it is said that they were the devil for a familiar spirit. The arch fiend professed to serve them during their life-time on condition that they would give him a soul. He was nothing less than a diabolical tyrant. So Cameron finds himself indebted to the republican party for his election--and so the readjusters, having invoked the aid of the republican voters, may expect to pay them in kind.

The republicans sat openly in Virginia that they intended to play the same game on Cameron and his party that the Democrats did in 1860 on Gilbert C. Walker and his followers. They put him in the gubernatorial chair and then declared their own terms to him. The true significance of the support given by the readjusters to the republicans seems never to have been grasped by the former, or else an attempt was made to conceal it, but they might as well try to conceal the fact that the whole of Arthur's breeches pocket--the thing can't be done. The 65,000 republican voters who were the backbone of the reorganized party that Malone has organized, and that party will feel the party lash from this day forward. The readjusters talk of electing a United States senator. The redoubtable Riddleberger, the intemperate Cameron and others who, with the readjusters, the broken-down politicians and other well-to-do fellows of the "readjuster party." Now let them lay their truth to heart. The republicans will see every mother's son of them who are not readjusters. So does not believe in before they will let them elect an officer from United States Senator. If a republican wants the place, if a republican makes a corpse walk up to suppose that the readjusters will bestow the United States senatorship upon them, or to allow any more rope than is good for them--which is very little, indeed.

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
