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Election of City Officers.

The new Board of Mayor and Aldermen were duly sworn in on last Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, and at 7 o'clock that night the Board met to elect the city officers for the present year. The city hall was crowded with the friends of the different aspirants for office, and before the balloting began a good deal of acrimony and anxiety was shown by the candidates and their friends. This, however, soon disappeared when the voting began and it was seen that every Alderman had his slate made out. The count of the votes resulted in the election of the entire old set of officers with the exception of the City Attorney. The following is the list of the officers elect:

Recorder—R. D. Reed. City Attorney—J. J. West. City Marshal—R. B. Walthall. Treasurer—W. P. Hume. Assistant Marshal—J. M. Moore. City Sexton—J. J. Lemaster. Bridge Keeper—A. B. Maxey. Fire Engineer—A. J. McNeill. Police—M. W. Carls, captain, W. W. Morrison, Frank Phillips and G. Holleman. G. Holleman was also elected day police and work-house keeper. Alderman Hyman was re-elected chief of the fire department.

After the election the Mayor announced his committees as follows: Finance—Ely, Williams and Wilson. Street—Williams, Ely and Wilson. Police—Young, Kleeman and Williams. Cemetery—Marr, Campbell and Hyman. Fire—Hyman, Young and Campbell. Schools—Wilson, Campbell and Kleeman. Market House—Kleeman Marr and Hyman. All salaries were fixed same as last year.

First Wednesday in each month was agreed upon as the regular meeting night.

After transacting such other routine business, the Board adjourned until next Wednesday night.
