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THE DEMOCRATIC LOVE FEAST.

The following from the associated press dispatches gives an account of the touching scenes witnessed in the Chicago convention immediately after the nomination of Hendricks:

"Then taking advantage of a temporary lull, the musicians who had caught the enthusiasm of the moment struck up the delirious and soul-straining strains of 'Auld Lang Syne.' The effect was electric; the tears on the outside will never be forgotten. The audience took up the song, and in a moment it was pealing forth from 15,000 throats.

The delegates from the various parts of the country were on their feet, and the men of Maine fell on the necks of their confederates from the North and South, and the latter but few hours before being hurled forth grape shot in showers, sat back in their chairs with their feet peering down at Hendricks. Hands clasped in hands, each voice trying to outdo the other, as the refrain in the name of the Auld Lang Syne was reached. On the platform was a circle, composed of President Vitas, Henry Watterson, General Blair, Colonel Rennie, of California, Gov. Waller, of Connecticut, and ex-Gov. Hubbard, of Texas.
