The attorneys for the defense presented a motion for a new trial. Argument of this motion was set for Friday, but most of the attorneys in the case having spent the week in attendance on the Circuit Court at Erin they were not prepared to proceed and the motion was not taken up. The prisoners will not be sentenced until the motion is over-ruled.

THE OFFICIAL VOTE.

We publish below the official vote of the United States for Presidential Electors. For comparison, we tabulate the vote of 1880 and 1884:

Table comparing 1880 and 1884 election results for Democrat, Republican, and Prohibitionist.

The increase in the vote for the four years is 775,271, of which the Democrats received 429,830, and the Republicans 345,476. The Greenback party has lost 189,847 votes, and the Prohibitionists have gained 120,513. In 1880 there was one vote in the States for each 53-100 of the population—49,369,956. Taking this as the basis, we have at present a population, not including the Territories, of 53,461,714, an increase of 4,091,749. The official vote for each of the four candidates is as follows:
