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OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

The President, Secretaries Manning, Lamar, and P. M. General Vile, left the city on Saturday afternoon to spend Sunday at the Club House of the Woodmont Road and Gun Club.

The distinguished party spent the Sabbath very quietly in a wild sylvan retreat of 4000 acres owned by the Club, and returned much refreshed on Monday.

The President has been working too long at night in order to dispose of the vast number of applications for office that await his attention. He is not exhausted, but he is very tired.

Last week he saw visitors only three days, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and experienced considerable relief from the pressure that had been put upon him.

The appointment of Mr. Stevenson of Illinois, First Assistant Postmaster General is one of the most fortunate selections the present administration has made.

He has attacked the large arrears of business with such energy that in the short space of a week over two thousand new appointments have been made.

To dispatch such a bulk of details with such general approval, and absence of ground for cavil, indicates executive ability of high order.
