Caldwell's School Bill.

We alluded a few days ago in the columns of the CHRONICLE to a bill introduced by our immediate representative in Congress, Hon. Andrew J. Caldwell, as a substitute for the Blair educational bill. The following extract from the Nashville Union, giving an interview with him, will throw some light on the nature of the measure:
"Congressman Caldwell of Tennessee has a new plan of his own in reference to the proposed system of national appropriation for the aid of public schools. He has introduced a bill by which he proposes that the proceeds of the sale of public land shall be devoted to school purposes, distributing the same according to the illiteracy noted in the various sections by the last census. 'I think,' he said to your correspondent, 'that this plan removes many of the objections which have been urged against the Blair bill and other measures of this character. There were, you know, serious doubts in the minds of many statesmen about the constitutionality of that plan of making appropriations outright for school purposes. There is no doubt, however, but what we have the right to appropriate the proceeds of the sales of our public lands to any national object which we may desire, and I think by this plan we shall be able to remove the doubts which have troubled so many people in regard to the other measures.'
"Would this proposed plan give as large a sum as that called for in the Blair bill?"
"Yes, larger, I think, for it would last longer. The sale of the public lands are going to continue many years, for there is an immense area yet unsold."
"Do you think a measure of this kind likely to pass the present congress?"
"I see no good reason to doubt it. The sentiment was very strong in favor of the Blair bill, which passed the senate last congress, and I think it will be still stronger in behalf of this one."

A Prisoner Escapes From the Jail—Rip Van-winkleism in Tennessee.

While carrying in the fuel he ran down a deep gully, and before the jailer could lock the doors and pursue, Britton made good his escape. The officers are scouring the country for the fugitive, and it is thought they will not fail to capture him. He is clearly guilty of the theft, and will use all the wiles in his power to make good his escape. He is now under bond to appear at the next term of the Circuit Court on an indictment for lewdness—having lived openly with a negro woman for several years.
