**Death of Mr. W. W. Morrison.**

**Mr. Wesley W. Morrison**, after a lingering illness from carbuncle died Tuesday morning at 4 o'clock, aged 52 years. For several years past he has been a member of the city police force and was always considered a faithful and competent officer. He was a good citizen and his loss will be felt by the community.

The funeral took place from the residence Wednesday at 2 o'clock. Services by Rev. J. R. Peebles, with Old Fellow's rites. Interment in the City Cemetery.

**A GYMNASIUM.**

To Be Established by a Number of Clarksville Young Men.

A number of young men assembled Wednesday in the office of Bell & Major to take steps towards establishing a gymnasium in Clarksville.

**Mr. G. M. Bell** was called to the chair, and **Mr. W. W. Hutchison** was made Secretary.

The idea is to rent a suitable hall and furnish it with all appurtenances necessary to a first-class gymnasium.

The following names were recorded as charter members: **R. A. Bailey, H. K. Atkins, G. M. Bell, Ernest Elder, Jno. S. Miller, Will Hutchison, Sears Major, Jno. M. Macrae, Townley Porter, Gracey Childers, Laurin Askew, Martin Cross, Dave Rudolph, Morris Clark, Wm. Major, Harry Gerhart, H. E. Beach, Jr., W. E. Beach, Ed. Beach, E. S. Munford.**

The following were appointed a committee on constitution and by-laws—**Atkins, Bailey and Hutchison.**

Messrs. Atkins, Bailey, Miller and Elder were appointed a committee for ascertaining cost of apparatus and outfit.

Messrs. Macrae, Porter and Gerhart were appointed a committee for securing a suitable hall or building.

There was quite a flourishing gymnasium in this city some years ago. It had a nice hall, well furnished and public exhibitions were given every month. In the course of time quite a fund was raised which the gymnasium company invested in a \$1,000 Tennessee bond.

The bond was disposed of for \$750, the sale having been fortunately made some years before the politicians began to agitate the State debt settlement. The lease of the Gymnasium Company had on their hall having expired and the owner thereof refusing to renew the same, they joined with the Hook and Ladder Company in the erection of a building to be used by both.

This building was burned in 1873 and part of the \$2,000 insurance on it was taken by the city of Clarksville for debts against the H. & L. Co.

There is now about \$1,000 in the Northern Bank to the credit of the Hook & Ladder Co.

The Gymnasium Company organized last night cannot, of course, succeed to any of the rights or property of the old company, but we would say merely by way of suggestion, that if the new company can effect such an arrangement with the H. & L. Company as the old gymnasium had, and put up a nice building, it would be a good arrangement.
