The Lower Red River Bridge.

In the report made by Mayor Howell to the old Board of Mayor and Aldermen at its last meeting, we find the following:

There are \$1,500 of lower Red river bridge bonds outstanding only, and that amount has to its credit, 1,330.36. I would not free that bridge entirely, unless the county would take charge of it and keep it in repair and insure same; otherwise I would reduce the tolls so as to yield say \$1,000 per annum. That amount would pay a keeper, insurance and repairs; and without some one to look after it, it would fall down, and then the city would be forced to rebuild, going in debt for the same.

The ex-Mayor managed the cities finances admirably and his opinion is entitled to consideration, but it seems to us that the bridge should be made free, even though a tax had to be levied to keep up the necessary repairs. The commerce of Clarksville is undoubtedly injured to a considerable extent by the heavy tolls that are required to reach the city, and all such charges should be reduced as much as possible.

The county should undoubtedly pay a portion of the expenses of keeping up the bridge, but we believe the city could better afford the entire cost than it can to continue the tolls and thereby shut out a large trade that would otherwise come here.

On Wednesday, Feb. 3, my attention was attracted to a ticket in the monthly drawing bearing the numbers 57 705. The combination pleased me, and concluding to try my luck on it, made purchase of one-fifth of the ticket, for which I paid the sum of \$1. This morning, Feb. 10, I called at the office of the company to learn the result of my venture, and to my great astonishment and delight, was told that I had won \$12,000." Hereupon the fortunate woman exhibited the winning ticket to the reporter, and said: "Sir that is all what I know to say, except to express my most hearty thanks for the blessing that has come upon me."

She was congratulated by the reporter and everyone in the office, and advised to take good care of her money. She received a check for the amount on the New Orleans National Bank, and departed as peacefully as she came, but with gratitude busy at her heart and plainly depicted in her honest face.
