Meeting of the L. A. & T. Subscribers.

On Friday evening, the 20, the subscribers to the L. A. & T. railroad, met to hear the report of the committee appointed at a previous meeting.

Mr. Henry Frech nominated Mr. John F. Coust for chairman in a happy speech. At first Mr. Coust declined, but Mr. Frech insisted that his modesty had always kept him in the background, whereupon Mr. Coust accepted the position and made a good chairman.

Mr. Hurst, one of the committee, stated that the committee had agreed to the L. & N's. proposition as the best thing that could be done, and they had mutually agreed to the dismissal of all lawsuits; the committee had gone to some expense, and he hoped that each subscriber would pay his proportion. Chairman Coust thought there would be no trouble in this regard. Mr. Hurst said that the subscribers must show their receipts to the trustee, Mr. Kennedy, and he would give them eight drafts on the L. & N. road, which would be paid. It was thought best not to discharge the committee until all the expenses incurred by them had been settled.
