The Fastest Boat in the World.

Messrs. Thornycroft, the torpedo-boat builders, of Chiswick, have just completed a new torpedo boat for the Spanish Government, which for speed has beaten anything that has yet been built. The new boat is 147 feet 6 inches in length, has a beam of 14 feet 6 inches, and draws 4 feet 6 inches of water. She has twin-screw compound engines, which act independently of each other, while the steering gear consists of two curved rudders, which make her the handiest vessel of the class yet afloat, as she is able to turn about in three times her length going at ordinary speed, which to-day was 54-84 knots with the natural draught.

On a trip the other day with the tide in her favor and forced draught she attained the extraordinary speed of 29.01 knots, or a rate of nearly 33½ miles an hour. Clarksville ought to have two of those boats—one to run to Paducah and one to Nashville.

Courier-Journal: The rapid spread of protection among foreign nations against American bread-stuffs since 1879 is one of the most remarkable features of the times. In France, Germany, Spain, Italy and Austria-Hungary, the duties on wheat range between fifteen and three-quarters and thirty cents a bushel; in Mexico and the Central and South American States the range is between twenty cents and \$1.02 per bushel; in Greece, Turkey, Switzerland and China the range is three and one-quarter cents to seven and one-half cents. In England, Russia, Belgium, Holland, Denmark and Sweden cereal imports are free. This set of events happened to arise in this way: The United States was by far the largest producer and exporter of wheat in the world, but the United States also maintained the highest import tariff against other nations. So, one by one those nations got their "backs up," and decided that it was in order to act on the principle that "the hair of the dog is good for the bite." It is a thousand pities, however, that the farmer, at whose cost those duties are chiefly laid here, is also made to suffer the direct brunt of foreign retaliation for a thing which is ruining him.
