Mr. Turner thought a majority of the vote cast in the last election for representatives—118,228—was all that would be required.

Mr. Vertrees thought the vote cast in 1885 was irrelevant; more than a majority would be required, and that the amendment must receive a majority of all citizens qualified to vote for representatives before it could be declared as carried.

Mr. Cartwright held that a majority of the electors who were qualified to vote for representatives, if the election was for representatives, was all that was necessary.

Great Excitement over his Unexpected Arrival.

DUNBAR'S CAVE, July 21, 1887.

The story published in your last issue of the hog at Martin, Tenn., that cut its way through the earth into a wonderful cave by continually knowing the sweetened dirt under a molasses drip, is no hoax as you cautioned the public it might be.

The hog arrived safely to-day at the mouth of Dunbar's Cave, having come all the way from Martin under ground. There is no mistake about this.

The hog made known his arrival by loud grunting at the gate and a number of visitors saw John Ricelet it out. The hog bears unmistakable evidences that it came from Martin, and can be proven to be the identical same hog by its tail, the molasses sticking to it and other signs.

Mr. Rice has the hog in keeping for the coming Stock Show, and will exhibit it free to the thousand of people who will attend the grand Reunion August 23rd and 24th, and the gentleman who saw it go through at Martin will be there to testify that it is the same hog.

Bill Taylor, Squire Fredrick, Major Tom Lewis, Col. Lyle, Capt. Tom McReynolds and others making the passage through "Hell's Hole."
