### The Drink Question.

A weird and terrible contribution to the literature of the drink question is contained in the last Contemporary Review (British). It is written by James Runciman, who tells us that those who know him might point to him, and, as he passes, say: "There is a man who has been in hell." For it would be literally true.

Runciman has no words severe enough to characterize the society which lionizes the manufacturer of alcohol, knights the great brewers, constitutes the maker of whisky a pillar of church and state, and spurns with its foot the drunkard off whom he has made his gains. Neither has Runciman a particle of faith in prohibitory laws. He says:

"I do not believe that you will ever stop one man from drinking by means of legislation. You may level every tavern over twenty square miles, but you will not thereby prevent a fellow who has the habit of a drink from buying himself mad whisky."

As for stopping a woman by such merely mechanical means as the closing of public houses, the idea is ridiculous to anybody who knows the foxy cunning, the fixed determination of a female sinner.

One might close every drink selling place in Britain, and yet those folks that had a mind would get drunk when they wanted it. You may ply bolts and bars; you may stop the working of beer engines and taps; but all will be futile, for I repeat that only by asserting power over hearts, souls, imaginations, can you make any sort of definite resistance to the awe striking plague that evenens the world.

Looking at brutal life, watching the rotting soul in the very fact, have made me feel the most careless contempt for statute mongers, because I know now that you must conquer the evil of evil by a straight appeal to one individual after another, and not by any screed of throttling jargon. One Father Matthew would be worth ten parliaments, even if the parliaments were all reeling off curative measures with unexampled velocity.

In a "fit of savage despair," Runciman chose to plunge into oblivion for a time, thinking he could emerge at will. He could not, and was only saved as by fire.

As factors in the ruin of boys, he puts among the first the low concert halls, that ply youths at once with fierce drinks and indecent jokes and songs, till they stagger out, to fall into the clutches of some creature, "half girl, half tiger cat, who will bring them up in good time."

Of the concert halls Runciman says: "I think I should shoot a boy of mine if I saw him enjoying such foul entertainment."

The only remedy is to arouse the noble emotions. Catch the children before they have become fatally tainted and take them out of the possibility of such a life. Let the old soakers die off, doing our best to see that the young do not follow in their footsteps. The writer ends his appeal thus:

Out of the depths I have called for aid and received it, and now I ask aid for others, and I shall not be denied.

### A Dying Industry.

A good illustration of how the world's industries change is given in the whale fisheries trade. It is an industry now almost extinct. One reason is that petroleum and cotton seed oil will answer the same purpose as whale oil in so many places and are so much cheaper and more easily obtainable that they are largely used instead of that. This has cheapened the price of whale oil so that there is no longer profit in fishing for whales for oil.

The whale of the polar regions, however, is still hunted for in both the Arctic and Antarctic oceans for its whalebone. This species of cetacean is called the right whale, and it is to secure it that hardly, brave men take their lives in their hands and remain in polar seas three to seven years.

Twenty-five years ago there were nearly 700 American whaling vessels on the seas constantly. Now there are almost none at all. There used to be great numbers of whales along the Atlantic coast as far south as Wilmington, Del. Now one is rarely seen along the shore of the States. Cotton seed oil and petroleum were discovered none too soon, perhaps, or the whale would have shortly become extinct.

### Traveling Royalties.

It has been suggested that, now since the little emperor of Germany is on his travels, he might with profit extend them to the United States. Undoubtedly the little emperor of Germany would see the United States sunk into Symmes' hole before he would do it. There never has been a king, emperor, czar or shah from the Old World on a visit to our republic. Louis Philippe staid here a little while when he was an exile, but never when he was a monarch.

Royalty has no love for republics. Dom Pedro, the democratic sovereign of Brazil, visited us once, but no ruler from Europe has ventured foot on our shores. In the nature of things they could not love us much. We are a standing menace to their trade.

Don't go to the Yukon gold mines of Alaska in a hurry. If you do, chances are you will not have money enough from your gold digging to bring you home. The winter freezes the gold up so miners cannot get at it, the spring floods wash it away, and there is not much of it anyway.

When Vanderbilt bought Maud S., \$28,000 was a price for a horse that took the breath away. But we are far beyond that now. The present high-water mark is \$105,000, which was paid for the 3-year-old trotting horse Axtell.

Our leather manufacturers export from this country \$10,000,000 worth of their goods every year. In their judgment there is indeed "nothing like leather."

The electric light on the Eiffel tower is visible at Orleans, sixty-nine and a half miles away.

### OUR AGRICULTURE.

The first report since the bureau of agriculture has been raised to a cabinet place partakes of the dignity of the situation. Our government does not appropriate more than a paltry sum for the improvement of agriculture, the report says. It is a sum in no way commensurate with our position as the greatest agricultural nation on earth, and nothing to compare with the amount spent for agricultural advancement by other countries.

The secretary asks for \$1,359,000 for the expenses of his bureau next year. He reminds us that England appropriates annually \$1,500,000 for agriculture; Germany, \$2,850,000; Austria, more than \$4,000,000; France, \$8,000,000, and Brazil, \$20,000,000 for agriculture and mines.

Sugar is a subject that has always interested Mr. Rusk, and he gives space to a report of the progress made in the last year in converting sorghum molasses into sugar. The original farmer called it sour gum when it was first introduced from China. Southern Kansas and adjacent parts of the Indian Territory have been found admirably adapted to produce sorghum sugar. On the Pacific coast and in some parts of the northern states a very rich saccharine beet can be grown, resembling that from which France and some other nations obtain sugar. So that, unless the sugar trust lays its octopus clutches on the whole United States, between sorghum, cane and beet, we shall be likely at some time soon to raise all the sweetening we need at home. But the sugar trust has certainly done us up this year.

A population of 30,000,000 are supported on the farms of the United States—half the population of the country. There are 5,000,000 farms and they grow annually \$4,000,000,000 worth of products. The value of the live stock alone in the Union would pay the national debt almost twice over, it being \$2,507,000,000. What other nation on the globe can tell such a story as that? Very few have a great country. Let us be true to it.

The report closes with this fine bit of wording:

The great nations of Europe strain every nerve to make science the handmaid of war. Let it be the glory of the American people to make science the handmaid of agriculture.

Nicholas Paine Gilman has made a valuable contribution to literature of the labor question in a book called "Profit Sharing between Employer and Employee." It illustrates the principle laid down by Professor Jevons—the best trade union is the union of employer and employee. From government reports and from information obtained privately, Mr. Gilman has gathered a large mass of facts throwing light impartially on this great question. For it is a great question. A powerful movement in favor of profit sharing between capital and labor has started simultaneously in Great Britain, in the United States, in Germany and in France. So that it seems likely we shall find out ere long just what the result of such profit sharing will be.

The New Orleans Times-Democrat, usually one of the most logical of journals, says that the acknowledged ability of the young negro student who has been chosen class orator at Harvard, proves nothing at all as to the powers of the colored race. Because one negro is intellectual is no sign that the rest are. Wrong, quite wrong, friend Morgan at Harvard shows what one negro has done. What one has done, others may do at any time. If one specimen of a race, tribe, or animal, accomplishes something unusual, that fact shows the possibilities of the whole. This is logic.

In addition to rescuing Emin Bey, Stanley has made an important geographical discovery on this his third journey to the Albert Nyanza, or lake. He finds that the waters of the lake Muta Nziye, on the southern border of Usongora, flow into the Albert Nyanza. The English call Muta Nziye the Albert Edward Nyanza. The Albert Edward Nyanza is 900 feet higher than the Albert Nyanza, and, flowing into it, thus becomes the true source of the southern branch of the White Nile. The Victoria Nyanza is the source of the southern branch.

The farmers of the northwest seem to be as good as their word in taking their affairs into their own hands. They are preparing to slaughter and pack their own live stock in an immense establishment in Lincoln, Neb. The packing house will cost from \$20,000 to \$30,000, and the plans for its construction are already made out. There will be \$10,000 subscribed to meet the work on its feet. The enterprise is co-operative one. One peculiarity is that the stock is non-assessable.

The Divorce Reform association demands that the national government shall take hold of matrimonial difficulties and make a uniform divorce law for the whole country. It urges as a reason for this that there have been a third of a million divorces granted in the Union in the past twenty years, and that there are now forty-six different sets of divorce laws in operation in the country. Well, among so many, we shall be pretty apt to find out the right ones, shall we not?

An Englishman, Mr. Ralph Abercrombie, has been making a careful study of the height of ocean waves, a point never yet exactly determined. Mr. Abercrombie concludes that in a storm they frequently reach sixty feet in height.


