A Pure Bred Sire Law For Virginia.

A petition is now in the hands of several of the Southwest Virginia members of the General Assembly from the stock raiser of that section of the state to pass a law in harmony with the constitution and other laws of the state to prohibit the charging of a service fee for any sire except a pure bred. This would apply with equal force to horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, etc. At present any one who wishes can obtain a license to keep a stallion or bull and hire his services to his neighbors at his own price. The person who issues the license may know nothing of the breeding or individual qualities of the animal for which the license is issued except what the owners may tell him and the owner may know little or nothing of the breeding of the animal. The idea is still prevalent among many of our farmers that a mixed or cross bred sire if a good individual, is as sure of transmitting his good qualities as a pure bred. This has long been proven untrue by good stock men all over the world. The longer a strain of animals have been bred along certain lines the more firmly are their qualities fixed and the more firmly fixed these qualities the more surely will they be transmitted to the offspring. This is the reason that our old breeds of animal such as the Jersey, West Highland and Galloway cattle are so much more prepotent than some of

the younger breeds. According to the best of authorities any cross into a pure bred strain of animals seems to make this plant of fixation of qualities less stable so that a sire the pure bred does not stand a chance of stamping his qualities on his offspring because of the disarranging influence of the foreign blood.

A standard of excellence is required by law of those who serve the public in other ways as with the dairy man, the doctor, the lawyer, etc, then why not a standard of excellence for the sire that determines the qualities of our animals. Such laws have long existed in the old world where nearly all our improved breeds of animals originated. We wish that a law could be made so stringent as to prevent the breeding together of animals unadapted to one another except for grading purposes. In the islands of Jersey and Guernsey where these breeds of dairy cattle originated it has long been unlawful to bring other breeds of cattle to the islands for any purpose other than butchering and they must be butchered within a very short time, perhaps 24 hours after reaching the islands. At present in Virginia a man can lead a large beef grade cow to a little Jersey bull and produce a calf inferior to either parent on which some one must eventually lose money. He may do this from ignorance or convenience but loose money and so does the man who buys the calf. We are glad to notice that some of our stock men who own pure beef bulls have refused to allow them to serve Jersey cows.

A law like the one suggested would at least discourage the business of keeping inferior sires for use of the public by withholding a legal backing for such business. The final adoption of this law might be left to the board of supervisors of the several counties and by them, before adoption, referred to a group of the leading farmers and stock raisers of the county.

The passage of such a law could only result in an increase in the number of pure bred cattle in the state and a general increase in the value of the live stock throughout the Old Dominion.

BIG CONVENTION OF STATE LAYMEN

All Churches Interested in National Missionary Movement.

Great interest is being manifested in the Laymen's Missionary convention to be held in Richmond, February 13, 14, 15, 16.

Fifty-one similar conventions will be held in leading cities of the United States between January 10th and April 26, 1916. All Virginia laymen are invited to register as delegates. This movement is interdenominational.

No more favorable opportunity could be offered the church men of Virginia to hear speakers of national reputation discuss topics of vital interest in connection with the great campaign for the evangelization of the world.

The men of Virginia are the kind who do things. They do not dream them all day long and they should make the coming convention one of the largest and most productive of good in the series planned for the approaching months.

Every churchman should register as a delegate. In order to secure the largest possible registration, committees are being formed in all the Protestant churches of the state whose duty it will be to enroll the men of their congregations. There is no limit upon the representation of

any church. The registration fee is only \$1.00 and every man who has an interest in the spread of the gospel should enlist now. Mr. Frank T. Crum, 215 American National Bank building, Richmond, is chairman of the registration committee. In those churches where registration committees have not been named, there is an opportunity for the laymen to get busy on their own initiative, enroll all the men possible and send in the names with the fees. Registration fees will be used to defray convention expenses and for follow-up work after the convention.

During the Richmond convention the speakers will be practical men who will discuss practical subjects in a practical way. "What Must America Do Under the New World Conditions?" "Recent War Experiences in Turkey?" "The Adequacy of the Gospel to Meet Modern Industrial and Social Conditions." "The War and Missions." "Where to Begin in Making the Church More Aggressive and Productive." "Religion in Business and Industry in Relation to the Social Conditions." "The Sort of Christianity Needed to Conquer the World." are some of the very practical topics which will be discussed.

It is estimated that fifty per cent. of American church members are inactive, either in definite forms of service or as regular contributors to current expenses and benevolences. Of the remaining fifty per cent, many probably need fresh inspiration and a widened vision. In order that all may be enlisted, every active church man is urged to participate in this interdenominational movement and invite other men to do likewise.

Similar missionary conventions will be held in all parts of the United States during the season of 1916. Twenty-one conventions have already been held since October 7, 1915, with a total registration of 34,000 paid delegates. The campaign is being organized by the Laymen's Missionary Movement with the co-operation of the missionary agencies of the different communions.
