Horrible Crime

Lee County Thrown Into a State of Excitement.

On last Friday at about 10 o'clock the community around Dot was shocked when they discovered that William Barnett had shot to death his mother-in-law and seriously wounded his wife. The crime which was committed on the top of Wallen's Ridge was the result of a family quarrel between Mr. and Mrs. Barnette. The report is that Barnette had been very cruel to his wife and that Mrs. Mendenhall, hearing of it, decided to take her daughter home and thereby avoid future disturbances. She, it seems went to the residence of Mr. Barnette and informed him of her intentions, and he is reported to have said, "If you do this I will kill you both if you do and there will be another man by that will see it well done." But the outraged mother undaunted hurriedly packed her daughter's grip and taking her little grandchild left the house and safely made their way to the top of Wallen's Ridge where the enraged man and, who true to his word, was waiting for them in company with Bill Hobbs, a brother-in-law. When the women came in sight he opened fire on them instantly killing Mrs. Mendenhall and fatally wounding his wife. He then took from her arms the babe and carried it to his mother's house and gave it to her saying: "I have killed them both and now I'll end myself." Hobbs was arrested and lodged in jail, but so far Barnette has not been found.

It is said that Barnette is a desperate man and that often times he had beaten his wife unmerciful. He was drafted and is reported in Class 1.—Jonesville Star.

Radford Normal Notes

The commencement exercises of the State Normal School at Radford will begin on Friday night, May 31, with a play by the Senior Class. On Saturday, June 1, the chief features will be the annual Field Day exercises and the exhibits of the

Household and Manual Arts Departments. On Sunday, June 2, the baccalaureate sermon will be preached by Dr. George P. Rutledge, editor of the Christian Standard, of Cincinnati, Ohio. On Sunday evening the Vesper Services will be under the direction of the Young Women's Christian Association. On Monday, at 10 a. m., the Senior Class Day exercises will be held. The meeting of the Alumnae Association will be held on Monday afternoon. The literary address and the graduation exercises will be held on Monday night, in the auditorium of the administration building. Dr. John Westen Hill, of New York, will deliver the address. The regular commencement exercises will be preceded by a musical recital and an exhibition by the Department of Physical Education on May 28 and 29.

The Senior Class numbers forty-nine members. About 20 per cent of this class have specialized in the high school curriculum for high school principals and teachers. About fifteen per cent have specialized in the Household Arts curriculum, and the other members of the class have specialized in about equal proportions in the Primary and Grammar Grade curricula.

Base Ball

Contrary to all expectations, as this was the initial workout of the players, the game was fast and snappy and some real classy base ball was seen throughout the game.

Appalachia found Baker almost equally as hard to hit and nine of them fanned.


Various Liberty Bond Issues.

There are at present issued and outstanding four issues of Liberty Bonds, and soon there will be six issues. They are as follows:

1. The original bonds of the First Liberty Loan; these bear 3-1/2 per cent interest and mature June 15, 1947, but are redeemable at the Government's option on or after June 15, 1932. They have a conversion privilege.
2. The original bonds of the Second Liberty Loan; they bear 4 per cent interest and mature November 15, 1942, but are redeemable at the Government's option on or after November 15, 1927. They have a conversion privilege.
3. Bonds of the second issue which have been obtained by the conversion of bonds of the first issue into bonds of the second; they bear 4 per cent interest and mature June 25, 1947, but are redeemable on or after June 15, 1932. They have a conversion privilege.
4. The original bonds of the Third Liberty Loan; they bear 4-1/4 per cent interest and mature September 15, 1928, and are not redeemable until maturity. They have no conversion privilege.

The other two issues which will soon be outstanding will be 4-1/4 per cent bonds obtained by the conversion of bonds of the first issue, and 4-1/4 per cent bonds obtained by conversion of bonds of the second issue, into bonds of the Third Liberty Loan. They will have no conversion privilege.
