ROANOKE AND NORFOLK.

Norfolk Public Ledger says: of the Roanoke Times, commencing upon which we wrote a few days since in reference to the industrial activities shown in our state during the exciting political contest.

Virginia in the next few years will witness an unprecedented growth, but there will be no such advancement as will be seen in the southwest, for the reason that its advantages are not so numerous as those of the other section.

From agricultural lands, the great lands bear a crop all the year around, and this section has no dull season. Everything is active and the people are busy and enterprising.

This is what you ought to have, in fact, must have, to fully enjoy life. Thousands are searching for it daily and mourning because they find it not. Thousands upon thousands of dollars are spent annually by our people in the hope that they may attain this boon.

The value of this language can be more readily understood when we remember that it is uttered by a paper published in a city which had no existence ten years ago, but which last Tuesday polled 2,415 votes. Mines and factories have produced the change, and as these multiply—as they assuredly will—the state will be greatly the gainer thereby.

The Ledger is undoubtedly right in its conclusion. Norfolk and the section immediately around it has numerous advantages, which cannot but cause the establishment of many new industries in a few years.

As Roanoke will be the great inland mining, manufacturing and railroad centre of the state, so Norfolk will be the great commercial city of Virginia.

The circumstances and conditions which have retarded the growth and progress of Norfolk so long have passed away with the new era of things, and the census of next year will show a much greater increase in its wealth, population and industry over that of 1880 than 1880 exhibited over 1870.

Since 1880 a number of railroads have made Norfolk, and the country which looks to it for business, their terminus. Among these are the extension of the Chesapeake and Ohio to Newport News, the construction of the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk road to Charles City and the building of the Norfolk Southern to Edenton, N. C.

The Atlantic and Danville and other roads in North Carolina are in course of construction and the Seaboard and Roanoke and Norfolk and Western have both largely increased their traffic and are extending their lines.

Many factories too, which prior to 1880 were particularly conspicuous by their absence, have been constructed, and the next ten years beyond doubt will witness the addition of many more.

With the advantages possessed by Norfolk, its safe harbor and the depth of its water, there is no reason conceivable why it should not, in a few years, be the largest and most important railroad terminus and Atlantic seaport shipping town south of Baltimore.

In its cotton trade it already occupies this position now, but both Savannah and Charleston probably contain more inhabitants. As new railroads to the south and west continue to be constructed to Norfolk, however, in a few years it must eventually outnumber them both.

The Norfolk and Western is already pouring thousands of tons of coal into her market every year, and when the proposed extension is completed through to the Louisville and Nashville it will empty much larger quantities of freight there for shipment than the large quantities at present. Roanoke and Norfolk both have great futures before them, and wise capitalists are perceiving it.
