

CITY COUNCIL.

THE BUSINESS IT DID LAST NIGHT.

THE STREET RAILWAY EXTENSION.

Streets and Sewers—Fines Collected Inmates of the Almshouse—The New Ordinance—Other Matters.

The City Council met in regular session at their room in the courthouse last night and transacted considerable business of a routine nature.

There were present Councilmen Buckner, Hawthorn, McCohen, Ruggles, Sheehan and Scott.

The mayor reported \$281.80 in fines collected during the month of October, and the superintendent of cemetery eight white funerals and nine colored ones.

The superintendent of the almshouse reported that there were nine new inmates during October, and the auditor reported \$47,306.08 as the balance charged to the treasurer.

The condition of building on the north side of Campbell-street, between Commerce and Roanoke-streets, was reported by the City Engineer to be unsafe. The report was adopted and so much as referred to Rorer Hall was ordered to be referred to the Public Property Committee with power to act.

Mr. Woodward, from the Committee on Public Property, reported several changes to be made in the almshouse, and the committee was given permission to act.

The ordering of fireplugs, in accordance with the recommendation of the chief of the fire department, was approved.

The city engineer was ordered to have a sewer laid between Patton and Harrison-avenues through the Reese lands.

Two thousand, nine hundred and forty-seven dollars and seventy-nine cents on account were reported and approved.

Mr. Woodward reported that the room in Rorer Hall for police headquarters was being fixed up.

The Roanoke Light Infantry was relieved from city taxes in running the skating rink.

The proposed extension of the City Street Railway out through the West End was reported by Mr. Buckner and adopted.

The petition of J. D. Bibb and others for a sidewalk on Pine-street, from Jefferson to Henry-street, was referred to the Street Committee, with power to act, likewise the petition of W. P. Camp & Co. for sidewalk on Robertson-street.

The ordinance offered by Mr. Wood, imposing a fine on corporations shutting off water in the city without giving due notice to the chief of the fire department, was adopted.

Mr. A. Cypress was ordered to be allowed to lay a sidewalk on south side of Fourth-avenue at the expense of the property owners, and under the direction of the city engineer.

The petition of W. C. Campbell and others for the opening of Harrison-street was referred to the Street Committee with power to act.

The protest of H. D. Cardwell and others in the matter of a sidewalk on Kimball-avenue was laid on the table.
