How to Keep Husbands at Home This subject, although apparently an easy one, is engaging the attention of some of the brightest minds of today. It is one of the most important subjects which can claim the attention of any wife. I shall endeavor to give you my best thoughts on the subject.

A wife's duty is not that of leader, but minister. She should be the guide, the adviser, the "power behind the throne." If she is a true woman, she will endeavor to supply her husband's needs in the best manner possible. It is from her that he should get love, sympathy and encouragement in the great battle of life.

While special cases require special treatment, yet we will take a general view of this subject, which is all we can do in this space.

We find that man possesses a complicated nature—a physical, intellectual, moral and religious nature. In the very nature of the case he will be comparatively happy if these wants are supplied.

We first, then, must base our conclusions on these first principles. We must go farther than the mere trickery of pleasing dress, etc. These must be regarded rather as effects than causes.

First, we should minister to our husbands' physical necessities. Of course, this includes everything which relates to his temporal well being. He must have a cheerful, happy home. No reasonable request should be denied. Comfort and even luxuries, as far as possible, should be supplied. Books, music, flowers, pictures, with a happy wife and children, are great powers in the home.

But this is not all. He must have intellectual companionship, and the true wife must furnish it. She must be up with the times, and take an interest in all the things he likes. She must study his tastes and preferences, and she must take an active interest in his business affairs and help him plan and devise. If she has tact, she will wisely direct him into the proper channel of thought without his ever suspecting it. We must be "wise as serpents and harmless as doves." She must prove herself a wise and true companion and confidante.

Thirdly, she must be a moral staff and guide. Men are not as delicate in their moral perceptions as women, and it is here that she can wield her greatest influence. She must take a stand for the right, come what may. She must have the courage to die in poverty rather than live upon the proceeds of ill-gotten gains. She must prune off all immoral twigs in her husband's character by her own precepts and example.

Fourthly, man's spiritual nature needs cultivation, and it is she who must do it. There is nothing so attractive as a well-rounded Christian character. If you possess this jewel you have a power over your husband almost irresistible. Your exercise of patience, kindness, politeness, sweetness, cannot fail in influence. After all, Christian love is the essence of all true happiness.

"Love stoops to earth in service sweet. And foremost treads the golden street." The religion of Jesus Christ will make you lovable, and your husband "seeing your good works, will glorify your Father, which is in heaven."

I believe these to be the fundamental principles which will enable us to keep our husbands at home, and if they fail there is nothing we can do but pray for them and murmur not, knowing that in "due season we shall reap if we faint not." M. L. T.
