AN ORDINANCE.

At a meeting of the council of the City of Roanoke, held January 14th, 1890, the following ordinance was adopted: Be it ordained that section 1 of chapter 20 of the General Ordinances be amended and reordained so as to read as follows: Section 1. No person shall permit his horse, mule, sheep, goats or cattle to go at large in the city; Provided, that such cows and heifer calves, which are being raised for cows by citizens of this city, may go at large between sunrise and sun down. Anyone violating this section shall be fined three dollars for each offense, and such animal or animals may be impounded until redeemed, and if not redeemed within forty-eight hours it may be sold, and the proceeds—after deducting the fine and costs for keeping and arresting, shall be held by the treasurer for the benefit of the owner. Section 2. This ordinance shall be duly advertised by the clerk of the council for at least ten days prior to February 1st, 1890, and go into effect and operation on and after that date.
