Installations of Officers of the Junior Hose Company—A Handsome Storehouse to be Erected—New Machinery for the Pump House.

EIGHT MEN ENTOMBED
A Gas Explosion in a Wilkesbarre Mine Cuts Off Escape.
WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 4.—An explosion of gas occurred in the South Wilkesbarre shaft yesterday afternoon. Eight men were at work inside the feeder at the time. In a few minutes the tunnel became filled with smoke and gas, which shut off all means of escape. There is a tunnel leading to Watson mine adjoining and efforts were made to reach the imprisoned men, but the rescuing party was driven back and compelled to give up the attempt. Superintendent Phillips and Inspector Williams are on way to the Stanton mine where they will make every effort to break through a pillar of coal and rescue the men if alive. The victims are Michael Ferry, Thomas Jameson, Thomas McDonald, aged 20, Thomas McDonald, aged 21, John McNealis (all single), and Frank Call, Hugh Dugan and Thomas Williams, men of family. The mine is owned by the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Coal company.

Just after dark last night a horse attached to a wagon which was being driven down Third avenue, by a colored boy, ran off, and threw the driver out, bruising him up considerably. The horse was stopped down on Holliday street.

Florida's Flight Wave.
St. AUGUSTINE, Fla., March 4.—The steady, still frost, but is moderating. The mercury was at 25. Bananas and early truck gardens are badly damaged. Orange trees are badly stripped and in some localities the trees have been killed. There will be a great loss on next season's crop, as the trees are all in bloom.
First Block of American Tin.
PITTSBURG, March 4.—The first block of tin produced from an American mine reached Pittsburg. The block of tin weighs twenty-five pounds and was taken from a tin deposit near Hermosa, S. D., by the Glenade Tin company. It has been examined by experts, who pronounce it excellent.
Public Building Bills.
WASHINGTON, March 4.—The house committee on public buildings and grounds has reported favorably bills making appropriations for public buildings as follows: At Hoboken, N. J., \$15,000; at Paterson, N. J., \$70,000; at Wilmington, Del., \$100,000; at Norfolk, Va., \$200,000; at York, Pa., \$20,000.
Ball Players Bound South.
New York, March 4.—John Ward and his team of baseball players departed for the south on the steamer Chattanooga for Savannah. The Philadelphia Brotherhood team accompanied by the Brooklyn League team also left on the steamer Iroquois, for Jacksonville, Fla.
Kilrain Must Go to Jail.
JACKSON, Miss., March 4.—The supreme court affirmed the sentence of the lower court in the case of Jake Kilrain, which is two months imprisonment in the county jail at Purvis and \$500 fine. Decision in the Sullivan case will be given next Monday.
A Boy Murderer.
AKRON, O., March 4.—At Cuyahoga Falls, a suburb of this city, several boys murdered a boy named George Patterson, aged 16, picking up a stone struck Edward Troutman, aged 8, knocking out his brains and killing him. Patterson has been lodged in jail.
Damaging Frosts in Alabama.
MOBILE, Ala., March 4.—The frost of the past three days did much damage to growing truck crops in this locality. Cabbages, celery, and other vegetables are damaged fully 25 per cent. All small vegetables are killed.
A Mine Owner Killed.
CHARLESTON, W. Va., March 4.—William Trueman, a coal operator, owner of several mines in this vicinity was caught in one of his coal tips and so badly injured that he died a couple of hours later.
The Gathering Class.
NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 4.—Several hundred delegates have arrived to attend the meeting of the Republican club in this city today. The convention meets at noon in Amusement hall.

Prosperity Killed Her.
PATERSON, N. J., March 4.—Rosa McCusker, 32 years old, was found dead in West Twenty-second street. Her death was due to alcoholism and exposure. At the morgue \$312 was found in a pocketbook tied around her leg. This money was all that was left of the legacy she received from her father's estate last summer and which started her on a course of dissipation that ended in death. Her brother received a legacy at the same time and while drunk was robbed of it in a Paterson saloon. The thief is now in Trenton jail.

Attempt to Rob a Bank.
RIDGWAY, Pa., March 4.—An attempt was made to rob the Elk county bank in this town. The burglars cut through the solid walls of the building and were working at the vault when they gave up the job. They were undoubtedly frightened away, as they left a number of their tools lying about the place. When the bank was opened the clerks discovered about four feet of the wall removed and brick, mortar, etc., scattered around.

No action has been taken by the committees on the invitations.
