Nothing has been done in Roanoke in this direction, however, and the matter should be attended to at once. A private letter received yesterday from Mr. Frank Hayward, who has the excursionists in charge, says that the greatest enthusiasm prevails among the editors as regards the great South-west.

We should let them see the section and Roanoke at its very best. I will reply you a thousand fold in the complimentary notices we will receive. The council and our citizens should take immediate steps to make the visit of both the Pan-Americans and the New England Press the pleasantest of their trip.
