THE EXPOSITION.

THE TIMES prints this morning, as a suggestion from VICE PRESIDENT ENDRY, of the Norfolk and Western, a plan for the proposed Virginia Exhibition to be held in Roanoke in 1892.

The plan is founded on a broad and liberal policy and will doubtless attract the attention which it deserves.

Roanoke is the leading city of the New Virginia. As an example of the spirit that animates the people of the present, it has no rival. Many followers it has, but all will concede that it has no leader.

It is in touch and sympathy with the spirit of the Present and the Future, and Virginians everywhere, no matter what section, point to it with pride.

The plan, as proposed, is in every way practicable. It is the thought of a practical man, representing a road that is the backbone of the State.

It is, of course, a skeleton, but it is a good prime work upon which to build, and it is just about time now to build in a solid and substantial manner.

Suggestions are in order and the TIMES wants to hear from every citizen of Roanoke and the State on the subject.

There is no question but what it will do every section in the State a great deal of good.

Let us not only talk, but let us work.

WATERSON ON BOOMS.

It seems to be the thing now to give one's ideas about booms and boomers.

Half the public men in the country have already done so, and the result is interesting.

Some of them say that the boom is an invention of the devil, others that it is the only hope of the South.

But it is a remarkable fact and one worth taking into consideration that the protest against booming generally comes from the people living in old cut and dried towns, whose hopes of a boom are as dead as are Billy Mahone's chances for the Governorship.

It is only natural, however, that this should be so.

Now comes this star-eyed Goddess of Liberty, better known as HENRI WATTERSON, and what he has to say will be found worth reading.

Kentucky has never enjoyed the opportunities afforded by a boom and therefore HENRI is not much impressed with the idea.

"Whenever and wherever you see the boomer spot him," says MR. WATTERSON. "The 'boom' is the devil's own invention. First, to rob the victim of his money and then the 'boomer' of his soul. Cities are not built by booms, countries are not advanced by them. They are the merest artificial stimulants, compounded of brandy, printers ink and midnight, and are as fatal to the community to which they are applied as a dynamite shell. True prosperity is the diffusion of wealth, cheap food for the poor and opportunities for all."

We don't know about the towns outside of the great Southwest section, but we do know that the later are not booming. It is a solid growth, with a foundation built upon the iron ribs of the mountains and all it needs is development. The cap MR. WATTERSON has been as much pains to make, with his dictionary by his side, no doubt, does not fit us.
