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

1st day of December 1880, at the
late residence of the deceased, in
the parish of Vermilion, there will
be exposed to the last and highest
bidder, — the following descri-
bed property, belonging to said

One certain tract of land situa-
ted in this parish, on the west side
of the bayou Vermilion, being the
same acquired by the deceased
from Mrs. Selazie Dartez, by act
passed before Thomas B. Brash-
