Arpent—Acre—An arpent is 4088 square yards. An acre is 4880 square yards.

No. 1 A plantation in this parish situated 1 1/2 mile from Jefferson's Orange Grove, (Lake Peigneur) 1 1/2 mil. east of Vermilion Bayou, 4 miles from Royville and 6 miles from Abbeville, containing 466 arpents, besides an undivided tract of woodland 2 miles from plantation.
