Geo. E. Lyons, was the successful bidder at the Building and Loan meeting Wednesday, getting \$1650 at 38 per cent premium.

Pierre J. Meaux, an old Confederate soldier died last Sunday at his home in the Cole's Island settlement and was buried here on Tuesday.

Eraste Hébert, of the Vincent settlement of this parish, made 45 barrels of rice on two and half acres of land last season. This is a very good yield considering the severe drouth that prevailed the past year and indicates what Vermilion rice lands can produce were the circumstances favorable.

A Move for a Central Sugar Factory.

Pursuant to a published call a number of the citizens and farmers of Abbeville and vicinity, met this day at the courthouse for the purpose of taking steps towards securing a central sugar factory at or near Abbeville. Dr. C. J. Edwards called the meeting to order and upon due motion J. H. Putnam was elected chairman and Dr. C. J. Edwards secretary.

Mr. Putnam, on taking the chair made a few well timed remarks on the subject of sugar manufacturing and enumerated the advantages for a sugar factory location possessed by Abbeville.

By request, Mr. Solomon Wise, gave his views regarding the best way of proceeding. He was of the opinion that after a site had been secured and sufficient money raised by subscription to pay for the erection of the buildings the necessary machinery could be procured on time.

On motion it was resolved that a committee of three including the chairman, be appointed to secure estimates on the cost of machinery and all details of a sugar factory.

Messrs J. H. Putnam, Solomon Wise and G. Godchaux were duly constituted the committee.

On motion, Resolved that the chair appoint a committee of three to ascertain the probable amount of cane which can be produced within convenient distance of the proposed factory.

Messrs W. D. Gooch, M. V. Lampman and Fred. O'Bryan were appointed as the committee.

On motion, Resolved that the proceedings be furnished the Abbeville Meridional and the Louisiana Planter and Sugar Manufacturer with a request to publish the same.

On motion the meeting then adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.
