Country Monds.

The problem of how to procure good roads has engrossed the attent tion of the lawmaking powers ever since this country has been settled; and as the country gets older and the necessity for roads becomes greater the problem grows more and more complicated. Various expe-dients have been tried, more or less successful, principally less and to-day in most parts of the country the public roads are nightmares, dust in the dry weather, impassable bogs in

The introduction of the bycicle has done much to improve the roads in the North and East, but the uso of the machines is not so extensive in the South, and consequently the roads have not received the attention they have in the sections refer-red to above. But even if we have not the same use for the roads for purposes of pleasure, we need them as much, if not more, for business. We have not as many lines of railroad as there are in the more thickly settled localities, and consequently our products have to be hauled a longer distance to reach these public carriers. The sugar and cotton growers know what bad roads mean at the time they market their crops.

Lately there has been an effort in Louisiana in the direction of better roads. In many parts of the State they still cling to the old style of turning out the "hands" who are assigned to duty on a certain road and working (?) it by this means. If anybody ever saw a road properly worked by such means we never heard of him. Such a summons generally means a day's picnic and frolic, with, maybe, a few fights thrown in, and the road is no better off than it was before it was "work-ed." This style of taking care of the public highways is about on a par with keeping up the militia by means of the old fashioned muster once a year of all the men of militia

age in the county.

> Mr. Baily, an Angora goat raiser of California, has been in Washing' ton trying to stir up the departments to do something towards obtaining from the Turkish Government permission to export from its territories a few hundred Angora goats for breeding purposes. Mr. Bally owns 10,000 Angora goats, 1000 of them pure-blooded, all of which have been bred from an original importation of four, but he says there is great need of some fresh blood in the stock. It appears, from the statistics gathered in view of the effort to set up a government goot farm, that the Angora goat industry now exists in thirty States and all the territories. Sizhundred thousand pounds of hair & year are raised here, supplying fine plushes for the Pullman Car Company and other large consumers; yet the industry is still in its infancy, and we import ten pounds of mohair for every pound we produce. The suitability of this important industry to our coast climate is not yet widely enough recognized.
