The Docket is Cleared and Summer Vacation Taken.

A. Gabriel appeared in court last Thursday and requested to be naturalized. Gabriel is a native of Turkey and said he wanted to become a citizen of the United States. His request was granted.

The Court issued a decree of interdiction against Frank Bennett, and he was ordered transferred to the Insane Asylum at Jackson.

Columbus Trahan, killing a steer or beef with intent to kill; Afone Hayes and Arthur Sarver, stealing a horse; Philip Perbert, Elisian Trahan, Jos. Primeaux, assault and battery; Oye Broussard, trespass; Aeras Segura, refusing to do road duty; Avery Briggs, assault and battery, arraigned and pleaded not guilty.

Elisa Trahan and Philip Herbert assault and battery, were each placed under \$50. bond.

Columbus Taahan, charged as above, \$500. bond.

William Johnson, cutting and stabbing with intent to kill, \$300 bond.

Adras Segura pleaded not guilty of refusing to do road duty.

William Hardesty, disturbing a peaceable assembly, fined \$10 and costs, or 90 days in jail.

Hienven O'Bryan, assault with a dangerous weapon, nolle prosequit.

THE NATIONAL GAME

Crowley and Abbeville Nines Give Fine Exhibition of Ball Playing.

Last Sunday's game of baseball between the Crowley and Abbeville nines was pronounced by all in attendance to be about the prettiest and most interesting one that has been played this season. The contesting teams were in fine shape and played good ball from start to finish, the game being called at four o'clock, with a large and enthusiastic crowd filling the grand stand and lining every point of vantage.

The visitors were the first at bat and were soon retired to give the Crays a chance to do some slugging, but they did not fare any better, the score showing a couple of goose eggs. The second terminated in the same manner for the visitors, while Abbeville secured one run. In the third there were two more cyphers added to the score and the fourth ended with two safe runs piled up to the credit of Crowley. The fifth, sixth and seventh innings resulted in more goose eggs, but in the eighth and ninth the Grays succeeded in getting over the home plate in good style, winning the game by a score of 3 to 2.

Some of the features of the game was a three-bagger by Baxter for the Grays, in the eighth inning, which gave the home team a chance to score. Louis LeBlanc also hit a fine three-bagger in the ninth and followed by Cordova at the bat, he safely scored. Trahan, the Grays first baseman tried to make a fancy left hand catch and allowed Crowley to reach first. Another pretty play was made by Eraste Gaudry.

The Grays had a man on third and Eraste, who was on second stole to third, making two men on the same base.

On the whole the boys did their best, and the few errors must be forgotten in the joys of victory.

Sluggers Were Defeated.

One of the finest games of the season was played on the Erath diamond Monday and was witnessed by a large and enthusiastic attendance. The Sluggers made three runs in the first inning and then shut out the Broussards for eight innings, not letting them find third even, but with two errors and a wild throw they succeeded in piling up four runs in the ninth, putting them one ahead at the finish. The Sluggers came to the bat but owing to bad luck in knocking the ball into the fielders' hands they could not score a run. Sid did some fine twirling, while his brother Sam was right there with the goods behind the bat. St. Julien, who pitched last year for the S. S. C. team of Bay St. Louis, was in the box for Broussard's and did splendid work. The features of the game were Jack Mouton's fine catch in left field and the Toole boys good playing on second and third. The Sluggers will meet the Pilette team on their diamond Sunday, August 6, and this team would, by all means, like to hear from the Abbeville Grays and arrange for a game on the Erath diamond, Broussard to pitch against the Grays cracker jack, Baxter. Parish Board of Health.
Abbeville, La., July 28, 1905.
The Parish Board of Health met this day pursuant to call. Present: Dr. C. J. Edwards, chairman, and P. Dupre LeBlanc, and M. L. Eldredge. Absent: Thos. Hoffpaar.
The chairman having presented a communication from the State Board of Health, and after discussing the subject of establishing a quarantine against infected districts, where yellow fever exists, it was
Resolved—That a rigid quarantine (to take effect immediately) be and is hereby established against all infected places, where yellow fever exists, or may hereafter become infected, and all persons coming into the limits of the Parish of Vermilion without first showing a "health certificate," stating that said person or persons have not been within an infected district within five days previous to the obtaining of said certificate, shall be subject to a fine of (\$50.00) Fifty Dollars, or (30) thirty days imprisonment in the parish prison, said penalty to be enforced by any court of competent jurisdiction. Adopted July 29, 1905.
