Thief Caught.
 Oscar Burns, a negro who often falls into the hands of the police and who was wanted for some time on the charge of carrying concealed weapons, was jailed Sunday forenoon by Sergeant Wheatley, Corporal Bengert and Patrolman Lewis, having been arrested at the head of Eliza street in company with Nicholas Amann, a young white man, both of whom are charged with gambling with dice on the sidewalk. COMPANY CAPITALIZED AT ONE MILLION DOLLARS.

The news of the good fortune of our prominent citizen, Dr. Robt. L. Riley, and a former Algerian, H. C. Ferriot, reached the Herald through information in the "Tampa Daily Times" of Jan. 16, which has a full account of the organization of the A. O. & G. R. R. Co. The road is to be constructed from Tampa, Fla., to Miami. The following clippings are taken from the Tampa Daily Times:

"H. C. Ferriot of New Orleans, president of the projected Atlantic, Okeechobee and Gulf Railway, is in the city to-day. With him are Dr. Robt. L. Riley, first vice-president, and Hiram McElroy, chief engineer. They arrived in the city last evening from Jacksonville and will inspect the right of way over which this road will pass. Mr. Ferriot stated to a Times representative that the subscription books for stock would be opened in about a month or less from date, but due notice of same would be announced in the local press."

"The Men Behind the Enterprise."
 "H. C. Ferriot, the president, is a well known business man of New Orleans, and the successful promotion of this railroad has been largely due to him. He is a former newspaper man, having been the owner and publisher of the Daily Chronicle of Algiers and New Orleans."

"Dr. Robert L. Riley, first vice-president, is a well known physician of New Orleans, and was formerly connected with the Southern Pacific railroad. His experience in railroad matters and the intricate details of their management and operation well fits him for so important a post. He expects to make Tampa his home in the
