ELECTION.

The following are locations of polling booths, and an accurate description of ward boundaries and election precincts of the city of New Orleans, for the election of an associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Louisiana, to be held Tuesday, March 7, 1911:

FIFTEENTH WARD.

All of the Fifth District (formerly Algiers).

First Precinct—From the river to the river side of Pelican avenue, and from the river to river side of Verret street. Location: 337 Morgan street.

Second Precinct—From the wood side of Pelican avenue to river side of Opelousas avenue, and from the river to river side of Verret street. Location: 418 Bouny, near Pelican.

Third Precinct—From wood side of Opelousas avenue to boundary line of the parish of Jefferson, and from river to river side of Verret and Hermosa streets. Location: 713 Brooklyn Ave.

Fourth Precinct—From the river to river side of Pelican avenue, and from lower side of Verret to upper side of Whitney avenue. Location: 645 Patterson street.

Fifth Precinct—From wood side of Pelican avenue to river side of Opelousas avenue, and from lower side of Verret street to upper side of Whitney avenue. Location: 501 Belleville street.

Sixth Precinct—From wood side of Opelousas avenue to boundary line of Jefferson parish, and from lower side of Verret and Hermosa streets to upper side of Whitney avenue. Location: 801 Slidell avenue.

Seventh Precinct—From lower side of Whitney avenue to boundary line of parish of Plaquemines, and from the river to the woods. Location: Public road and Lee's Lane.

NEW CANNING FACTORY.

Within the next few days a branch plant of the Biloxi Canning Company will be opened in Algiers. The building formerly used by a box factory near the river front, on Socrates street has been leased. The machinery has been placed and is now being set up.

W. A. Gordon, one of the members of the company, stated last Thursday afternoon that the future development of the plant rested entirely upon the business which was done. There would be every facility to carry on all the features of the canning industry. He said the truck farmers would be expected to furnish tons of their products to the company.

Speaking of the location Mr. Gordon said it was first-class in every particular, and he felt optimistic as to the success of the venture. Oysters, shrimps, figs and vegetables will be put up. For the present the company will buy the boxes knocked down, but if the project moves rapidly a small boxmaking outfit might be added. Mr. Gordon said for the time being he was devoting his attention to getting the plant started, and he left its future to the response of persons who should be interested in making it a success.

Besides Mr. Gordon others interested in the company are: T. J. Patton, of Biloxi, and Henry Clark, who will come from the main plant to Algiers as manager. It is intended to give work to as many persons living in the Fifth District as will be needed.

CHURCH WILL BE BUILT.

Ben W. Borne Gets Contract To Do Work—Old Building Will Be Remodeled—Work To Begin At Once.

A week from next Sunday holy communion will be celebrated for the last time in the old church.

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
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RETURN REGISTRY RECEIPTS.

You have perhaps wondered why, when a registered letter has been mailed that you did not receive, in a few days, a return receipt signed by the addressee, showing they had received the registered letter or parcel. This custom has been discontinued by the post office authorities and the only receipt given now is a small piece of white paper which is handed you when you register your mail. If a return card receipt is desired it will be necessary to so state on the letter or parcel that is sent, by merely writing across the letter or parcel, "Return receipt requested." When this is written the old form of return card will be mailed.
