

At the office of the Sewerage and Water Board there is a bulletin posted every day showing a list of every permit issued to the licensed plumbers who have obtained permission to connect the premises of customers with the City Sewerage System.

Duplicates of these permits and the plans which accompany them are kept on file at the board's office and it would be a matter of only a few moments research to locate the plumber who should be responsible for any improper or irregular work which might escape the careful scrutiny of the inspectors, as every fixture and every pipe has to be shown on the plan.
