ALGIERS POLICE FIND WHITE GIRL WITH TWO NEGROES.

A young girl, traveling with a negro man and a negro woman, and seen entering the premises of another negro in Algiers, aroused the suspicions of certain citizens of Algiers, with the result that the trio were arrested and held Saturday night at the eighth precinct police station for further examination.

According to the story told, the negro man, William Langford, also known as Cheney; the negro, Della Cheney, and the white girl, Lillie Broodwell, aged seventeen, came from Hammond Saturday night and went to the residence of Francois Lewis, another negro, living at 1023 Verret St., Algiers, from which place the arrest was made.

At the station the parties declared they were in the employ of a Mrs. Hartwell, in Hammond, who conducted a boarding house. The girl at first said she came to the city to have her fortune told, but later became reticent and refused to talk. While being held at the station the girl became violently ill, and Dr. Rupp, assistant coroner, was summoned to prescribe for her.

MEYER AGAIN AFTER ORLEANS NAVY YARD.

Secretary of the Navy Meyer is planning another determined campaign for the abolishment of the New Orleans navy yard.

He has decided to recommend to congress the abandonment of all but four of the navy yards. He realizes he will meet bitter opposition.

The new plan calls for the development of the yards at New York, Norfolk, San Francisco and Puget Sound. The plan is proposed in reports of Rear Admiral Wainwright and other naval experts.

It is extremely doubtful if it will be approved with the Democrats in control of the house. It is planned to use the money saved by this economy in increasing the fleet efficiency and equipping repair ships for making repairs at sea.

VACATION SCHOOLS OPENING JUNE 19.

Announcement was made Thursday by Assistant Superintendent Bauer to the effect that two vacation schools will open their doors on Monday, June 19. The work will be conducted largely along industrial lines, with special attention provided for grammar grade pupils who have been deficient the past term in one or more studies.

We, the undersigned citizens and property owners residing near the Naval Station, who signed the letter which appeared in the Item this (Sunday) morning, reflecting on the attitude of Mr. Peter Lawton in the matter of the locating of the proposed new school at this place, hereby declare that subsequent developments in this matter fully satisfy us that Mr. Lawton, who originated the petition for said school and who has worked for its establishment for the past several years, does not propose to make any issue with us which would injure our interests in any way, since he is himself a resident of this locality and largely interested in its welfare. Mr. Lawton assures us, and we believe him, from his past efforts in behalf of this community, that his activities in the matter thus far, have been with a sole view of having said school located in the most desirable spot in the new district and that his controversy with Mr. Henning has been largely personal. ALGIERS LOTS FOR IMMIGRATION STATION. SCHOOL LOTS PURCHASE IS APPROVED.

Expropriation Proceedings to be Directed for Mr. Gast's Property.

As Uncle Sam is very anxious to build his new immigration station, and as Mr. Cornelius Gast refuses to be separated from three acres that are desired for this purpose except for a price that Uncle Sam is not disposed to pay, District Attorney Charlton R. Beattie Tuesday morning brought suit in the United States Circuit Court before Judge Rufus E. Foster to have the value of the land determined by twenty-four unbiased freeholders. This means that the land will be expropriated.

The new immigration station was provided for by the Act of March 4, 1907, and the condemnation or expropriation of the land necessary for the completion of its boundaries was requested in a communication from the secretary of commerce and labor, Chas. Nagel, to the attorney general.

The land which it is desired to expropriate comprises about five lots and Mr. Beattie declares that it has been impossible to acquire the land because Mr. Gast is demanding an "exorbitant price and one greater than the government of the United States is willing to pay." In his petition he asks that the value of the land be determined by twenty-four freeholders, and this request is complied with by order of the court. Mr. Gast will be notified, and the valuation will be fixed in ten days.

In Mr. Beattie's petition it is stated that the land is needed for public buildings and other public uses, and that there are no improvements on the property at the present time.

This expropriation procedure indicates that Uncle Sam intends to push the work on the new immigration station, and that the machinery of the department of commerce and labor, through the attorney general, has been set in motion to accomplish something in this direction.
