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THE MASONIC BANQUET.

Seventy-five Took Part—An Enjoyable Evening Spent.

On Saturday night Sts. John Lodge of Masons No. 153 of our district, celebrated the feast day of St. John the Baptist with a banquet at Touche Bros. "Over the Rhine," at Spanish Fort. This was the fifty-third annual celebration of the order and seventy-five of its members took part. The members met at the Canal street ferry, city side, where a special car was in waiting, which conveyed the crowd to the new resort. The banquet hall was nicely decorated and the guests were well served by the corps of waiters in charge.

During the serving of the dessert, several toasts were drunk and members responded to various subjects, the first being to the President of the United States of America. No. 2 on the program was the Grand Lodge, F. & A. M., State of Louisiana, which was to have been responded to by John S. Thibaut who was absent.
