PRESENTED WITH TESTIMONIAL BY HIS BIBLE CLASS, LADIES' GUILD, CONGREGATION AND HIS FRIENDS — RECEIVED A PURSE OF \$125.

Mrs. Spierier is a charming lady who has won many friends by her amiability and her excellent qualities of heart and mind.


