CITY TO ADD \$2,000 TO ROAD FUND

President Fasterting of the police jury of Plaquemine parish, and Simon Leopold, who represents that parish in the Legislature, called on Mayor Behrman Thursday and stated that the parish of Plaquemine police jury had adopted an ordinance appropriating \$2,000 for the construction of the cut-off road and that private citizens had agreed to give \$2,000 in addition and asked that parish of Orleans appropriate \$2,000, making \$6,000 in all.

Mayor Behrman, after consulting with City Attorney Moore, instructed him to draw up an ordinance providing for an appropriation of \$2,000 and also directing City Engineer Hardee to prepare the plans and specifications for the work. This road runs in both the parishes mentioned and the roadway was used for military purposes over a hundred years ago. It will facilitate truckers and others in coming to New Orleans and Algiers.

Mr. Winthrop told his visitors he is preparing a letter covering the entire situation as to the Department's attitude in the naval station matters.

The letter is for President Taft, and is in response to a note sent by the President to the Department earlier in the week.
