CHARTER
OF JAMES SCALLEN REALTY COMPANY
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, STATE
OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF OR-
LEANS.

Be it known, that on this thirty-first day
of the month of August, in the year of our
Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven,
before me, John Wagner, a notary public,
in and for this parish therein residing, and
in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter
named and undersigned, personally came
and appeared the several persons whose
names are hereunto subscribed, who de-
clared that, availing themselves of the laws
of Louisiana, relative to the organization of
corporations, they have come and do hereby
by themselves, their associates, suc-
cessors and assigns into a corporation for
the objects and purposes and under the
conditions hereinafter set forth, which
they hereby adopt as their charter, to-wit:

ARTICLE "ONE."
The name and title of this corporation is
hereby declared to be "JAMES SCALLEN
REALTY COMPANY," and it shall have
and enjoy corporate succession for a period
of ninety-nine years, and shall have and
exercise for the purpose of the business to
be carried on by it, all powers conferred by
law upon corporations, including the power
to receive, purchase, lease, sell, mortgage,
pledge, improve and exchange, and other-
wise acquire and alienate property, both
real and personal, in the prosecu-
tion of its business, to contract, and be
sued; to make and use a seal, if it so de-
sires; to make or break or alter at pleas-
ure; to make rules and by-laws, by the
government, the same to after, amend or
change at pleasure; to make and employ
such managers, and to employ as its busi-
ness may require; and generally to exercise
all the powers necessary to carry on its
business.

ARTICLE "TWO."
The domicile of this corporation shall be
in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, and
all citations and other legal process shall
be served on the president, and in case of
his absence or disability, on the vice-presi-
dent, and in case of absence or disability of
both, on the secretary-treasurer.

ARTICLE "THREE."
The objects and purposes for which this
corporation is organized and the nature of
the business to be carried on by it, are
hereby declared to be to buy, sell, mortgage,
exchange, improve, build or otherwise im-
prove, or otherwise alienate or acquire, and
generally deal in real estate, improved
and unimproved, in this city or else-
where, for itself or for the account of others,
as principal or agent, on commission or other-
wise; to lease and improve the same, and
to generally carry on the real estate busi-
ness.

ARTICLE "FOUR."
The capital stock of this corporation is
hereby declared to be divided into one thou-
sand shares at the par value of one hundred
dollars each, which shall be paid for in cash,
before the corporation shall have the right
to commence business, when twenty-five
thousand dollars of the capital stock shall
have been subscribed for. All transfer of
stock shall be made on the books of the
corporation, and a certificate of stock shall
be issued in accordance with the laws of the
state.

ARTICLE "FIVE."
The affairs of the corporation, including
the powers to buy, sell, mortgage or in any
wise acquire and alienate real and personal
property, shall be managed by a board of
directors, composed of three stock-
holders. The directors shall be elected an-
nually by ballot by the stockholders on the
second Tuesday of January of each year,
commencing on the second Tuesday of Jan-
uary 1913. Each stockholder shall be en-
titled in person or by proxy to a vote of
each share of stock owned by him, and such
election shall be subject to the rules as
may be adopted by the board of directors.
The directors thus elected shall continue in
office until their successors shall have been
elected, and no failure to elect shall be
regarded as a forfeiture of this charter. Any
vacancy occurring on the board shall be
filled by the remaining directors. The
board of directors shall at their first meet-
ing after their election, nominate and
elect one of their number to be president
and a secretary-treasurer. Until the
first election as above specified, Mr.
James S. Gauthreaux shall be president,
Dr. Henry E. Gauthreaux shall be vice-presi-
dent and Mrs. Mary Scallen Gauthreaux shall
be secretary-treasurer, which three shall
constitute the board of directors until the
election above specified. All meetings of
stockholders, whether general or special,
shall be held after notice and a meeting
shall be given in writing to each stockholder
by the secretary-treasurer, either in person
or by mail, ten days prior to said meeting.


ARTICLE "SIX."
At the termination of this charter, either
by limitation or otherwise, the business or
affairs shall be liquidated by two commis-
sioners to be appointed by the stockholders
at a meeting convened for that purpose,
after the ten days' notice required
above has been given, and a majority of the
votes cast at such election. Said commis-
sioners shall remain in office until the
affairs of the corporation are liquidated
and in case of a vacancy the same shall be
filled by the stockholders in like manner,
until such time the survivor shall continue
to act.

ARTICLE "SEVEN."
This charter may be changed or altered
or amended, or the corporation shall be
dissolved or liquidated by a vote of two-
thirds of the capital stock, as presented
at a meeting of the stockholders convened
for that purpose, after the ten days' notice
shall have been given as above specified.

ARTICLE "EIGHT."
No stockholder shall ever be held respon-
sible or liable for the contracts or debts of
the corporation in any further sum than
the unpaid portion of the stock subscribed
by him, nor shall any mere informality in
this charter null or of expiring the stock-
holders to any liability beyond the unpaid
balance due on the stock subscribed by
them.

**HINTS FOR THE
BUSY HOUSEWIFE**
The Rotary Grater a Useful
Kitchen Utensil.



An Ohio woman designed the rotary
grater reproduced herewith. The old
fashioned method of grating a nut-
meg, onion or whatever it might be
was to rub the article up and down
on a rough surface. This implement
works differently. A wheel with a
grating surface is mounted on an up-
right, which is clamped to the edge
of the kitchen table. A holder is
hinged to the center of the wheel, and
in it is placed the article to be grated.
The wheel is turned with the object
pressed close against it and the grind-
ing process accomplished very expeditiously.
When enough has been
grated off the holder can be lifted and
its contents allowed to drop into the
dish below.

Roast Sparerib.
Select a sparerib from a young pork
and have the ribs broken in two
places, so as to fold up and form a
three cornered opening. Mix one tea-
spoonful of salt and one teaspoonful
of sugar. Rub both sides of the ribs
with the mixture. Sprinkle lightly
with pepper. Make a dressing as for
roast turkey or chicken of moistened
stale bread, one onion, chopped; two
eggs, beaten; two tablespoonfuls of
butter, pepper, salt and sage to taste.
Place the dressing in the ribs and fold
over the sides. Place in roasting pan
with one teacupful of boiling water.
Roast for two hours until the meat
loosens from the bone, basting occa-
sionally. Serve with tart apple sauce.
This makes a meal for six.

Lobster en Casserole.
Rub the inside of a casserole with
the cut surface of a clove of garlic.
Break the meat of a boiled lobster into
large pieces and fry in olive oil, add-
ing a tablespoonful each of chopped
onion, carrot and parsley. Add a bay
leaf, a pinch of thyme and two table-
spoonfuls of sherry. Cook for twenty
minutes, then take out the lobster and
keep hot. Add to the sauce one-half
cup of beef stock and one-half cup
steamed and sliced tomatoes. Sim-
mer for ten minutes, put in the lob-
ster, reheat and serve.

Plums in Rice Border.
Cook rice in milk until tender and
quite dry, adding a pinch of salt when
it is half done. Make it rather sweet
with powdered sugar and pour into a
border mold to set. When ready to
serve turn it out carefully and fill the
center with very rich stewed plums.
Pour a little of the syrup over the
rice and heap whipped cream over the
plums. The stones should be removed
from the fruit and the kernels sim-
mered ten minutes in a little thin
syrup and then mixed with the fruit.

Stuffed Beef Heart.
Boil the heart three hours. When
done have just enough water for grav-
y. Make a dressing of one-half cupful
of breadcrumbs, one-half teaspoonful
of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of
pepper, one-half teaspoonful of sage,
one-half small onion, chopped fine; one
tablespoonful of butter and hot water
enough to moisten and mix thorough-
ly. Cut out the tough muscles and
stuff the heart. Sew up and put in
oven with liquor. Thicken the gravy.
Serve hot or cold.

Apple Grunt.
Peel and slice thin six large ripe
apples and put in deep pan for baking.
Add one cupful sugar, one-half cupful
water and nutmeg and stir thoroughly.
Make thick batter of one large cupful
four, one heaping teaspoonful baking
powder. Add one tablespoonful lard
and one tablespoonful butter. Then
pour the batter over apples and bake
until done and nice and brown on top.
Serve with milk and cream.

Candied Apples.
Put a cupful of brown sugar with a
little water on to boil, and when it
threads dip sound tart apples in the
candy and cover thickly. Put a stick
in the apple to hold by. You will have
something to please the little ones
and it won't harm them either.

Chili Sauce.
Twelve ripe tomatoes, four small on-
ions, three small peppers, three table-
spoonfuls of salt, six tablespoonfuls of
sugar, three cupfuls of vinegar. Chop
all very fine and cook away nearly
one-half.

To Whiten Lard.
If when rendering lard you add a
half cupful of milk you will find it will
make the lard smell sweet and pure
and make it white as snow.
