"MADAME SHERRY."

To the Tulane theater for one week beginning on Sunday evening, comes "Madame Sherry," which last season was the distinct novelty. The comedy and production comes practically as its entirety. Miss Ada Meade, the popular prima donna, again heads the cast.

CHARTER

OF EUREKA LAND AND OIL DEVELOPMENT COMPANY
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF ORLEANS, CITY OF NEW ORLEANS.

Be it known, that on this fourteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eleven, and of the independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and thirty-sixth before me, Philip Gensler, Jr., a notary public in and for the parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, therein residing, duly commissioned, sworn and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereto subscribed, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana, in such cases made and provided, they have covenanted and agreed, and do, by these presents, covenant and agree and bind themselves, as well as all such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form a corporation for the objects and purposes and under the articles and stipulations, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name of this corporation shall be Eureka Land and Oil Development Company, and under its said corporate name it shall have the power and the authority to have, acquire, lease, purchase, hold, convey, sell, lease, mortgage, and otherwise dispose of, in fee simple, all such lands, minerals and gas lands; to operate pipe lines; to build, purchase or lease same; to buy and sell oil, minerals and gas, and to do everything incidental to the development of oil, mineral and gas lands and the sale of oil, minerals, gas and their by-products.

ARTICLE II.
The domicile of said corporation shall be in the city of New Orleans, State of Louisiana, and all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the president of said corporation, or in the event of his absence upon the vice-president, and in the absence of both of said officers, upon the general manager of said corporation.

ARTICLE III.
The objects and purposes of this corporation are hereby declared to be: to engage in the general business of oil, mineral and gas lands; to engage generally in the oil, mineral and gas business and by-products of same and to do everything incidental to the development of oil, mineral and gas lands and the sale of oil, minerals, gas and their by-products.

ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation shall be fifteen thousand dollars, divided into one hundred and fifty shares of one hundred dollars each. Said stock shall be paid for in cash at such time and in such amount as after such notice as the stockholder as the board of directors shall determine. Any stockholder wishing to sell any of his stock must first offer same in writing to the board of directors for thirty (30) days, and they have the right to purchase same at book value.

ARTICLE V.
All the corporate powers of said corporation shall be vested in a board of directors, to be composed of seven (7) stockholders to be elected annually on the second Monday of May of each year. All such elections shall be held at the office of the corporation, or such other place as may be established by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI.
Whenever this corporation shall be dissolved, either by limitation or otherwise, its affairs shall be liquidated by three commissioners to be elected from among the stockholders at a general meeting convened for such purpose, in the manner and form provided for stockholders meetings in the succeeding article of this charter, and a majority in amount of the capital stock of said corporation, represented at such meeting, shall be required to elect. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the corporation shall have been fully liquidated. In case of inability of any commissioner to continue by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the vacancy shall be filled by the surviving commissioners.

ARTICLE VII.
This act of incorporation may be modified, changed or altered, or said corporation may be dissolved with the assent of three-fourths of the capital stock, represented at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose, in the manner and form provided for stockholders meetings in the succeeding article of this charter, and a majority in amount of the capital stock of said corporation, represented at such meeting, shall be required to elect. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the corporation shall have been fully liquidated. In case of inability of any commissioner to continue by reason of death, resignation or otherwise, the vacancy shall be filled by the surviving commissioners.

ARTICLE VIII.
No stockholder shall ever be held liable for the contracts or debts of said corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares of stock owned by him, nor shall any more informally in organization hereafter formed have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing any liability beyond the amount due on his stock.

ARTICLE IX.
This charter may be changed, altered or modified by a vote of two-thirds of the stock present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose after ten days' notice shall be given to each stockholder, in writing, by the secretary, directed to his residence and sent by mail.

ARTICLE X.
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be liable or responsible for the faults or contracts thereof, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any more informally in organization hereafter formed have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing any liability beyond the amount due on his stock.

ARTICLE XI.
This charter may be changed, altered or modified by a vote of two-thirds of the stock present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose after ten days' notice shall be given to each stockholder, in writing, by the secretary, directed to his residence and sent by mail.

CHARTER

OF COMMERCIAL TRUCK AND AUTO MOBILE COMPANY, LIMITED.
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF ORLEANS, CITY OF NEW ORLEANS.

Be it known, that on this twenty-sixth day of the month of August, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eleven, before me, Lewis Rossner Graham, a notary public in and for the parish of Orleans, therefor duly commissioned and qualified, and therein residing, and in the presence of the hereinafter named competent witnesses, personally came and appeared, the several persons whose names are hereto subscribed, who severally declared that, availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana in such cases made and provided and particularly of the act of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana for the year 1904, they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these presents covenant and agree and bind themselves, as well as such persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form a corporation for the objects and purposes and under the articles and stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name and title of this corporation shall be the "Commercial Truck and Automobile Company, Limited." It shall have its domicile in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, and shall have and enjoy the same corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years, from and after the date hereof, unless sooner dissolved as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II.
It shall commence business at once as soon as six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) in full paid stock is issued. It may have, hold, purchase, sell, convey, transfer, lease, pledge or mortgage property, movable and immovable. It may sue and be sued and have a seal of such form and device as its board of directors shall elect.

ARTICLE III.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) divided into one hundred shares of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) each, which shall be paid for in cash, property or services. All stock shall be transferred only on the books of the corporation by the stockholder or his duly authorized agent and attorney in fact.

ARTICLE IV.
The business of this corporation shall be managed and conducted by a board of three (3) directors, all of whom shall be stockholders; the first board of directors is hereby declared to be composed of Richard Brock, Edward C. Ansley and John D. Edwards, with Richard Brock as president-treasurer, Edward C. Ansley as vice-president and John D. Edwards as secretary. These directors and officers so designated, shall hold their offices until the last Saturday in August, 1912, or until their successors have been elected and qualified.

ARTICLE V.
On the last Saturday in August, 1912, and annually thereafter, an election for directors shall be held at the office of the company after ten (10) days' notice, in writing, shall have been given by the secretary to each stockholder or his duly authorized agent or attorney-in-fact, and the same to be given or mailed to each stockholder at his residence.

ARTICLE VI.
At the termination of this charter by limitation or otherwise, the business affairs of this corporation shall be liquidated and wound up by two (2) liquidating commissioners who shall be chosen at a general meeting of the stockholders called in the same manner as the meeting to elect directors and officers. In case of a dissolution, there shall be two commissioners similarly chosen for such purpose to dissolve. The election of either shall be by a majority of the stock present or represented.

ARTICLE VII.
This charter may be changed, altered or modified by a vote of two-thirds of the stock present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose after ten days' notice shall be given to each stockholder, in writing, by the secretary, directed to his residence and sent by mail.

ARTICLE VIII.
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be liable or responsible for the faults or contracts thereof, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any more informally in organization hereafter formed have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing any liability beyond the amount due on his stock.
