#### \$100 REWARD GOES TO LACOSTE FAMILY.

Detectives and Patrolmen Agree They Want to Make Contribution.

To the general public, a policeman is a big man, with a big club, who enforces the law, at the peril of his life and with the vigor that sometimes results in cracked skulls. Seldom, if ever, does the average citizen pause to realize the size of the heart beating beneath that blue coat.

A telegram was received from McAlester, Okla., several days ago by Chief Long, asking that Louis Hougle, a fugitive from justice from that city, be arrested on sight, as he was in New Orleans. A reward of \$100 was offered for his capture.

Detectives James P. Glynn and Henry Littleton arrested the man after they and Assistant Chief Mouney, Detectives Methe, Dantonio, Dillman and Patrolman Gregson had been assigned on the case.

In their report to Inspector Reynolds, the two detectives say: "In talking over the matter of reward with the detectives assigned on the case, it was the unanimous agreement that we would request you to ask the honorable board of commissioners of the police department, to turn over this \$100 reward to the family of Patrolman Lacoste, who was killed by the negro, James Edwards, while in the performance of his duty, on November 1, 1911, as we feel that this amount may to some extent alleviate the suffering of his wife and children."

#### THE OPEN COURT.

The People of Algiers As Good As Any in the State.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 15, 1911.

Editor of Daily Picayune: Having been a reader of your valuable paper for a number of years, I am going to ask the privilege of a little space to refute some of the charges contained in a very objectionable article printed in an afternoon paper of this date.

The article in question is aimed at the dirty condition of the Canal street ferry boats, and I am not writing this in defense of the ferry company, for anyone who, like myself, takes four trips a day on those boats knows that there is plenty of room for improvement.

But what I do take exception to is the class of people pictured as riding to and fro all day. Algiers, like other districts in this or any other city, has its poor, and we have no apologies to offer for that, but any stranger reading that article would imagine that "laborers," "hollow-chested Chinamen," and a "cur dog" occasionally are the only creatures crossing on the ferry to our side of the river.

Mr. Editor, I consider that article a base and malicious slander on the people of Algiers. We, over here, are proud of our suburb and we can point with pride to the business as well as social standing of our residents. As I said before, I have been a frequent passenger of the ferry boats for a number of years, and I have yet to see a trip when only tired men and women and squalor are the only occupants of the boats.

I don't know how much of a circulation the paper in question has on this side of the river, but I do think if it increases after such an expression of its views we deserve all we get.
