ALGIERS CITIZENS IGNORED

IN IMMIGRATION OPENING—PROGRESSIVE UNION DOES NOT PLACE ALGIERS MAN ON COMMITTEE, ALTHOUGH MANY ARE MEMBERS OF PROGRESSIVE UNION.

To Ask New Cabinet to Open Algiers Immigration Depot.

The program for the formal opening on March 27 of the United States immigration station in Algiers will be arranged in part at a meeting of the immigration committee of the Progressive Union Wednesday. Judge Thomas J. Freeman, chairman of the arrangements committee, will be assisted by a committee composed of twenty-two members, but among this number there is not an Algerine mentioned.

Capt. Samuel E. Redfern, United States immigration commissioner, also will assist.

The committee will issue an invitation to David F. Houston, new Secretary of Agriculture; William C. Redfield, new Secretary of Commerce, and William B. Wilson, new Secretary of Labor.

The opening of the Algiers station will take place during the conference of the Southern agricultural chiefs.
