HOLDS LAW UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Judge Chretien Holds Koppel Act is Discriminating One.

On the ground that it discriminates between industries of the same class, and is local and special legislation, the Koppel act of 1912, the statute passed by the last Legislature prohibiting the employment of stationary firemen for more than eight hours a day, with certain exemptions, was Wednesday declared unconstitutional in a decision handed down in Section B of the Criminal District Court by Judge Chretien. The decision was in the case of the State vs. Arthur Barba, manager and secretary of the Orleans Ice Manufacturing Company, 1207 Chartres street. Assistant District Attorney Henriques gave notice of an appeal to the Supreme Court, and it is probable that the statute will be subjected to further scrutiny, for it involves great interests throughout the state, and was considered one of the most important measures passed at the last session of the Legislature.

The exemption clause in the statute is that which brought about the adverse decision by Judge Chretien, for he found the law unconstitutional principally upon the grounds that such exemption makes it legislation affecting a special class, and he alleged that it was unjust discrimination. The exemption clause applies to "stationary firemen or assistants employed in the petroleum industry, in any cotton gin, or any sugar plantation, or in the saw-mill industry."

A CURB-STONE INVITATION.

Following the announcement in The Herald of last week that no one from Algiers had been appointed to serve on the committee in the dedication of the New Orleans Immigration Station, and following the reproduction of our article in one of the city papers, we are informed that Jos. Lennox has received an invitation and a request to appoint a committee of three and to act with this committee on the day of the dedication.

We are indeed sorry that Algiers should be such an insignificant place in the eyes of the New Orleans Progressive Union and especially do we regret that apparently in the opinion of the New Orleans Progressive Union there is not, on this side of the river, men of sufficient prominence to be appointed in what affects our side of the river to a greater extent than it does the east bank.

We regret very much that it was necessary for The Herald to call attention to this conspicuous oversight. One of our contemporaries has the following to say:

"Algiers Gets Honor After Many Tears—Progressive Union Wants Delegates to Immigration Ceremony.

"The Progressive Union has decided to honor Algiers by appointing residents on the committee of immigration at the immigration station ceremony in Algiers soon. The Algiers Improvement Association was asked Tuesday to participate in the festivities.

"The failure of the Progressive Union to appoint any one from Algiers grieved the town. The Union then was criticized.
"J. W. Lennox will appoint three to participate in the festivities."
