### FIFTH DISTRICT CIVIC LEAGUE.

Want Milk Station For the Fifth District—Playgrounds Principal Topic of Discussion.

The meeting of the Fifth District Civic League on the night of Aug. 18 showed renewed energy in the matter of securing a playgrounds for our district. The ladies who attended the League meeting all agreed to put their shoulder to the wheel and use every effort to bring about a solution of the playgrounds question for our district.

A letter was received from the Janke people in which they agreed to furnish sand for the children's sand boxes. This is to be used in conjunction with other articles to be placed on the grounds so kindly loaned by the Cumberland Telephone Company. Mrs. J. E. Huckins reported that besides the sand and benches that have been pledged for the playgrounds, eight large swings are already in hand for erection just as soon as the grounds can be placed in proper condition.

The matter of a milk station for our district was also brought up. It was stated at the meeting that while on the city side of the river there are five milk stations in charge of a paid attendant who looks after the distribution of the milk for the poor little infants that there was no station established in our district for distribution of milk. A committee of three was appointed to take up the matter and to wait on the physicians of our district regarding the question of a milk depot here. The committee consisted of Mrs. A. Amuedo, Mrs. E. Nelson and Mrs. C. W. Abbott.

The elocution and dramatic class will be regularly established under the able direction of Miss Mamie Haggerty, a talented young graduate of the New Orleans College of Oratory. Two lessons will be given each week, and monthly recitals, to which the parents and friends of the pupils will be invited, will be held. In connection with the elocution class, lessons in dancing and physical culture will be given.

The music, which is of a high class order, is under the able direction of the Superior, Sr. M. Xavier. Miss Mary Legras will continue to give lessons to beginners up to a certain grade unless by special request. Should there be a sufficient number of applicants, violin will be taught by Miss Nellie Ready.

Father Larkin, the devoted pastor, who has done so much for Algiers, fully recognizes the educational needs of the day, and has deeply at heart the true intellectual, moral and religious training of the children of the parish to whom he is devotedly attached. His ever watchful care leaves nothing undone to promote the high standard of the school. The good Catholic people of Algiers may justly be proud of the excellent work done in this progressive and up-to-date school, and should lend their co-operation and kind encouragement by sending their children on the opening day.

The school will be conducted along the same lines with regard to tuition as in past years. The rumor that it will be free, is absolutely without foundation.
