TWO SUSPECTS HELD AFTER PROBE INTO FIRE.

Following an investigation by the Eighth Precinct police and Deputy Fire Marshal Haggerty Saturday into the fire that occurred early Friday morning in the building at Newton and Webster streets, occupied by Joseph Catalanotte, an Italian, and his family, and on a statement made by Catalanotte to Assistant District Attorney Ben Daley, John Whalen, aged 23, living on Sumner and Diana streets, and Matthew Cazeaux, aged 23, living on Sumner street, near Socrates street, were arrested late Saturday afternoon and locked up in the Eighth Precinct station on a charge of arson.

He is a laborer at the Johnson Iron Works. Cazeaux is employed by the Algiers railway.

At the corner of Newton and Webster streets Catalanotte conducts a business. Early Friday morning he was awakened by smoke that filled his bed chamber. On investigation he found that the front portion of his store was afire. After getting his family to a place of safety he summoned the fire department. A lot of waste saturated with oil was then found. On a report of this fact Deputy Fire Marshal Haggerty and the police began an investigation. Both concluded that the place had been set on fire.

Catalanotte Saturday afternoon appeared in the district attorney's office. Later, by telephone, Assistant District Attorney Daley ordered the arrest of Whalen and Cazeaux.

Both Whalen and Cazeaux denied all knowledge of the crime.

They were arraigned and upon pleading not guilty both men furnished a \$500 bond.

According to Ed St. Germain, he was out recently with the two men when one made the proposition to burn the place.

"It has been our ruin," one declared. "Let's burn it," averred St. Germain. He declared he afterwards saw one of the men apply a match to the building.

The Catalanottes have figured several times in police circles, and twice before they have been implicated in mysterious fires which destroyed the dwellings in which they lived. Nick Catalanotte recently figured prominently as the assailant of Thomas W. Goreau.

ALHAMBRA'S NEW HOME

New Building To Be Begun Shortly.

Plans Now Being Drawn.

The members of the Alhambra Gymnastic Club were delighted last week when they moved into their new home, 426 Olivier street, the main building of which had all been repaired and remodeled for the purpose.

The lower floor of the present building contains one large hall about 28x50 feet. This will be known as the reception room and library. In the rear of this is the kitchen and serving quarters. On the second floor, where partitions have been removed, there are large billiard halls and lounging rooms.

The new addition which will shortly be begun will be connected on to the main building but will take in the entire width of the lot and extend back for a distance of 40 feet, going to the property line.

On the first floor of the addition will be the shower baths, tub baths, toilets and lavatories, and the principal feature being the big swimming tank which will have dimensions of 25x20 feet and a depth of from 4 to 5 feet. Just above this will be the gymnasium, giving a floor space of 30x40 feet.

There is also to be fitted up on the second floor a ladies' dressing room, and also other conveniences for the ladies who will be permitted to avail themselves of the bathing facilities of the club and to enjoy their eucure games at the new home.

Plans for the addition are now in course of preparation and bids for the construction of same will be asked for within a short time. The transfer of the real estate from the Liquidators of the Firemen's Building and Loan Association to the club took place last week.
