### MEN ARRESTED.

On complaint of Miss Lillian Martinez of 1524 Teche street, James D. Hall of 328 Slidell avenue, a lineman for the Algiers Railway and Light Company, was arrested by Patrolmen Wolvertson and Kramer and charged with insult and abuse and threats to kill. Miss Martinez, who claimed that she went to see Hall about a board bill, which was owing to her mother, was not only shamefully abused by Hall, according to her story, but also was threatened with a revolver, which Hall drew from his hip pocket during the argument over the money, at 6:45 o'clock, on the levee at the head of Delaronde street. Hall denies that he either abused Miss Martinez or drew a weapon.

### VACCINATION RULES.

Dr. Edmund Moss, medical director of the public schools, has adopted a set of rules to govern the vaccination of teachers and pupils. Before announcing the rules, he submitted them to Dr. W. T. O'Reilly of the City Board of Health, and had them approved by the health officer. The rules number six, and are:

1. Vaccination is required every seven years.
2. A successful vaccination is good for seven years.
3. When a teacher or pupil shows evidences of a former successful vaccination, two unsuccessful attempts by a physician practicing in Louisiana is good for two years.
4. Where there is no evidence of a former successful vaccination two unsuccessful attempts at vaccination are good for one year only.
5. Teachers or pupils furnishing evidences of having had variola are exempt from vaccination.
6. All teachers fifty years of age or over are exempt from vaccination.
