**DROWNS IN RIVER.**  
Fisherman Rodriguez Falls from Skiff at Naval Station—Sailors from the Hancock Witness Accident and Make Unsuccessful Search For the Body.

While fishing for shrimp from a small boat at the stern of the transport Hancock, at the Naval Station, John Rodriguez, of 1631 Mazant street, was seized with an epileptic fit and fell overboard. Sailors from the Hancock dragged the river with hooks for several hours, but were unable to recover the body.

Rodriguez was 31 years of age. He was only recently released from the Louisiana Retreat, where he had been confined because of the fits from which he suffered. Rodriguez was alone in the boat. Sailors saw him rise to his feet to pull in a net, and then to suddenly crumple overboard. He made no struggle in the water, and this is taken as evidence that he was unconscious.

Ensign McComb, who was officer on the deck at the time, ordered the sailors to begin a search for the body with grappling hooks. A brother and brother-in-law of Rodriguez called at the ship later. Rodriguez was bundled up in heavy clothing, and as his body was caught in a swift eddy, he would have had but little chance for his life even if he was conscious.

**BOY HUNT FATAL.**  
One Strikes Rifle With Stick, Other Youngster Killed.

As a result of playing roughly with a cocked gun, Vincent Dufuentes, 1019 Vallette, a boy of 16 years, is dead. He, with James Seymour, 938 Belleville, and Edward Jackson, of Verret, near Diana, had gone to the rear of the Algiers pumping station on a hunting expedition yesterday forenoon. Seymour carried the 22-caliber rifle cocked on his shoulder, while Jackson was some distance behind. Dufuentes struck the rifle with a stick and the weapon exploded, the bullet striking the unfortunate Dufuentes in the right side of the abdomen. The police were told of the affair and carried the almost lifeless body of the lad to the police station. When the ambulance surgeons came the boy was dead.

**TREASURY DEPARTMENT DEMANDS EXPLANATION FROM HARRY S. MANSON.**

**Revenue Cutter Commander Is Alleged to Have Posed As White Slave Investigator.**

Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo has instructed the local office of the revenue cutter service to direct Master's Mate Harry S. Manson, detailed in command of the revenue cutter Davey, to submit to the department such explanation as he may desire to make regarding the circumstances of his arrest recently in the Cosmopolitan hotel cafe on the charge of disturbing the peace.

The arrest of Manson followed what was alleged to have been his boisterous conduct when he is said to have proclaimed himself a white slave investigator, and it is said, insulted a woman who was dining with a party of friends.

**SAILOR WITH PUSHCART.**

Albert Brown, a marine quartered at the Naval Station, must have had a jolly good time of it last Thursday night. About 4:30 o'clock Friday morning he found himself on the Canal street ferryboat bound for the Naval Station. He had with him a pushcart, and Supernumerary Brown, who was on his way home from detailed duty at the Saus Souci cabaret, thought it passing strange that a marine should be pushing such a vehicle and questioned him. Brown, the marine, told Brown, the policeman, that he bought the pushcart for \$5, from a party on Royal, near Canal, while on his spree. The policeman relieved him of his burden and left the pushcart in the Algiers police station to await a claimant.

It was identified by Paul Finerty as the property of his employer, a moving picture show operator, on Friday evening, and it was turned over to him. Brown has not had his \$5 returned for him, the amount he says he paid for the cart.
