FOXY GRANDPA.

A few weeks ago a gentleman came to The Herald and represented himself as Mr. M. J. Farrell showing credentials that he had worked on several newspapers throughout the states of Mississippi and Louisiana. He purchased from The Herald a certain amount of advertising space in which he was to run a story known as "Foxy Grandpa." He then called on many of the merchants in our district, sold them space in the Foxy Grandpa stories and in many instances collected the money in advance. For this Mr. Farrell is now in jail awaiting trial. He not only victimized some of the Algiers people but he also worked St. Bernard parish and several other newspapers on the other side of the river. He is being charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.

Mr. Farrell no doubt has seen better days. According to his credentials he has been making good throughout the different states and cities where he really has executed the Foxy Grandpa stories to advantage of the advertisers as well as the profitable investment for the newspaper.

When seen at the jail Mr. Farrell acknowledged that he had done wrong and that his error was the result of drink, which he said he regretted very much. Tears came into his eyes as he expressed regret for this action and stated that his only reason was that whiskey had gotten the better of him. He stated that he will make every effort to make good every dollar that has been collected and start out again new. He will be tried later on.

The arrest of Mr. Farrell showed some excellent work in the detective office. A meagre description was given Chief Reynolds who at once sent out circulars describing the man and it was only after a very short time that he was placed under arrest.

READY TO REOPEN LOCAL NAVY YARD.

Department May Send a Rear Admiral to New Orleans.

Washington, May 9.—Assistant Secretary Roosevelt has completed every necessary arrangement for reopening the New Orleans navy yard, but Secretary Daniels continues withholding the approval needed to redeem the promises that have been made time and again. The assistant secretary's report of the inspection trip he made to the yard months ago has been ready for publication for so many months that it is getting yellow around the edges.

Ten days ago Mr. Daniels said there surely would be something done with regard to the yard "next week," that is, during the week that has just been finished, but he has gone to New York to honor the dead whose bodies are being brought home from Vera Cruz. He will be back Tuesday or Wednesday.

It is the understanding that the personal of the force to take charge of the yard has been agreed upon and that coincident with the publication of the order reopening the yard will come orders sending the commandant and his staff to the yard. Whether the command will be a flag officer or one of lesser grade cannot be said. Inasmuch, however, as there are so many more rear admirals than there are fleets, squadrons and divisions to be commanded, the chances ought to be in favor of a rear admiral of senior grade, that is, one whose relative rank is that of a major general of the army.

CITY HAS RIGHT TO APPOINT RECORDER.

AFTER MANY MONTHS OF PATIENT WAITING by the contestants on both sides of the troublesome Algiers recordership, the supreme court Monday decided that the commission council had the right to name the recorder in the fifth recorder's court in the event of a vacancy, and that the governor was without power to do so under the new charter of the city of New Orleans.

The supreme court thus upholds the judgment of Judge Porter Parker, of the civil district court.

Mrs. Robinson is a native of Algiers, having been born here twenty-seven years ago. She is survived by her husband, two small children, and by her parents. The funeral took place Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from her late residence, 531 Seguin street. Interment was private.

HOTARD.—On Sunday morning Mrs. Jos. R. Hotard, nee Agnes Rodgers, died. Deceased was a native of Algiers, having been born here thirty-four years ago. The funeral took place Monday evening at 4 o'clock from her late residence, 215 Olivier street.

PLANT.—On Saturday, May 9, at 8:05 o'clock a. m., Mrs. Louisa Weber, wife of Capt. Robt. C. Plant, died at her home in the city. Mrs. Plant was a resident of our town for many years and was well known here.

SPANISH GUNBOAT NOW A TOW-BOAT.

Sold for a song, the Alvarado, once the pride of the Spanish navy, will leave her berth here in a few days for Mexico to serve as a towboat for oil barges in the Panuco river at Tampico.

From a gunboat in his Castilian majesty's navy to a towboat on a muddy stream is a far call, but the Alvarado went down with the honors of war.

She was taken from the Spanish at Santiago in the Spanish-American war, and was used later at the Naval Academy. In 1906 the Alvarado was turned over to the Louisiana Naval Reserves, and six years later was sold in New Orleans. She is now being fitted out with oil-burning engines, wireless and electric generators. She is 110 feet over all and 16-foot beam.

BIG TRANSPORT TO BE REMODELED.

The army transport McClellan, which carried the Twenty-eighth Infantry to join Gen. Funston at Vera Cruz from Galveston, arrived at the Naval Station late Sunday, and Quartermaster Captain William O. Smith and his force of assistants began the work of converting the vessel into a refrigeration ship, to be used in carrying beef to Vera Cruz.

She will be put in seagoing condition before she is entirely cleared out and a refrigeration plant installed on her. Capt. Smith declared also that a departure had been made for the army, as the McClellan, when completed, will be the army's first refrigeration boat.

Until a late hour Sunday night Capt. Smith was aboard the transport, and Monday he left several of his assistants with the ship at dry dock. It will take approximately six weeks or more to complete the job, bids for which will be asked shortly.

"While our plans are somewhat hazy at present," Capt. Smith said, "work on converting the transport will begin when bids have been accepted."

He said it was fair to assume that the McClellan's supplies as a refrigeration ship would be purchased in New Orleans.
