The penny party to be given by Mrs. Casard's class at the home of Mrs. Casard, August 4th, will evidently be a very pleasant and successful affair.

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
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

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MR. MANION'S GOOD WORK IN THE LEGISLATURE.

Whereas, Hon. Martin H. Manion, at the recent session of the Legislature, did sponsor and secure enactment of the following three great public measures prepared and presented by the New Orleans Association of Commerce, which, requiring constitutional amendment, will be submitted to the people:

"First—An act fixing reasonable terms for the re-entry of foreign banking corporations, which will doubtless attract such corporations to this state and thereby prove invaluable in the development of our cotton, coffee, lumber and other export and import trade.

"Second—An act exempting from taxation money in hand and on deposit, which will doubtless pave the way to the retention in this state of millions of dollars which would otherwise be forced away.

"Third—An act authorizing the Dock Board to construct a canal from Lake Pontchartrain to the Mississippi river, which, if consummated, will doubtless open up large areas of unoccupied territory for industrial and commercial purposes, with location equivalent to that on the river front; and

"Whereas, Mr. Manion did sponsor and give of his best efforts to the urban assessment bill prepared by this organization, but which, after passage in the House, was so amended in the Senate as to be repudiated by this organization and thus not enacted; and

"Whereas, Mr. Manion did assist this organization in its efforts before the Legislature looking toward the advancement of New Orleans and Louisiana; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the board of directors of the New Orleans Association of Commerce unanimously extends to Mr. Manion the hearty thanks of this organization."
